THE SHEEP INDUSTRY.

The Oregon Agriculturist, an unquestionable authority on matters of this kind, has this to say of the sheep industry in Oregon: "The farmers of Oregon will this year obtain not less than \$5,000,000 from the sale of wool and sheep. The sheep industry of the state is now almost as much of a factor as wheat in supporting the people of Oregon. If wheat should continue low in price and sheep and wool remain high, it will not be very long until the sales of sheep and wool will bring more money into the state than the sales of wheat."

Four years ago this industry was practically ruined, and yet under the beneficent influence of the McKinley tariff it has been so fostered and encouraged that it has completely revived from the staggering blow dealt it by democratic legislation. A government may not have power to control the elements or possess a man of talents he was not born with, but it can so protect and encourage an enterprise that men with talent to succeed may do so under favorable conditions. It cannot guarantee a bountiful harvest of wheat nor control the production of this article abroad, nor can it insure an increase in a flock of sheep nor stay the growing of wool in foreign countries, but it can reserve the home market for the home producer, and give him the benefit of the high prices made by a strong demand.

THE PRINCIPLE OF THE THING.

The Pharisee followed strictly rules and regulations. He excused no deviation from law. No corn must be plucked on the Sabbath though the unfortunate one starved. Humanity must stand aside for "principle."

The republican party demands the freest possible commercial intercourse between the several parts of our country. That is a principle of the party. But when distressed Porto Rico needed relief; when the devastations of war and raging elements paralyzed her industries and impoverished her people; when money for the equipments of a better civilization was demanded, the republican party suspended its creed and went to the rescue with the best means at hand. He who condemns the republican party for providing Porto Rico with an immediate and gentle means for relief in a temporary tariff, lauds the Pharisee and condemns the good Samaritan.

Let us, as theoretic statesmen, loudly denounce the Porto Rican tariff if we will, but as considerate men may we not defend and uphold a party that can discard doctrine to relieve suffering.

The critics of the administration do not see the difference between the duty levied upon tea and other articles by England, which was designed should be paid by her American colonies—the tax so collected to be used for the support of the home government and not for the colonies in any particular—and the tax now levied by the recent bill passed by congress, known as the "Porto Rico Bill," which levies only 15 per cent of the tariff paid on goods shipped into

this country from foreign countries, said 15 per cent levied upon certain merchandise shipped from the United States to Porto Rico and from Porto Rico to the United States, and the tax when collected to be turned over to the local treasury of Porto Rico to be expended solely for the support of the government of Porto Rico. Much of this tax will not be paid by the people of Porto Rico, but on all goods shipped into the United States will be paid by our people at home, and when so paid it is to be sent to Porto Rico for the benefit of the people there. Hence it will be seen what little shadow of excuse these critics have had to spend so much thunder upon. They assume that everything done by the party in power is wrong, but suggest no remedy.

Aguinaldo's conception of how a free government should be conducted prompted him to cause General Luna, one of his insurgent chiefs, to be assassinated because Luna was so popular and strong that Aguinaldo feared that by his popularity he might interfere with Aguinaldo's plans. This is the Filipino whom United States Senator Hoar characterizes as trying to establish a government in the Philippines as did George Washington in the United States.

McKinley's syndicates are now trying to involve the United States in war with Turkey. No one is trying to involve the United States in war with Turkey, but demo-popo demagogues are endeavoring to force the United States into war with Great Britain.

New Train Service.

The double train service to be established between Portland and Chicago April 22nd, in which the O. R. & N., the Union Pacific and the Oregon Short Line are interested, will shorten the through time 11 hours. Train No. 2 leaving Portland at 9:15 a. m., beginning on the date named, will be known as the Chicago-Portland special. Its equipment will be new, making it fully the equal of any train now in service from the Pacific Coast to the East. It will consist of a mail-car, a baggage-car, a library-composite car, a first-class Pullman sleeper, a dining-car, two chair-cars, and a tourist sleeper. There will be but one change of cars to all eastern points. The full time will be three days through to Chicago, or four days and two hours to New York.

The second train, known as No. 6, will leave Portland at 6:20 p. m., connecting at East Portland, with the southern Pacific's overland train from San Francisco, and will carry through equipment to Chicago via the Union Pacific and the Chicago & Northeastern, and also the equipment for the Washington division of the O. R. & N., in connection with the Great Northern for St. Paul. This train will reach Spokane at 10 a. m. Dining-car will be furnished for breakfast into Spokane, and for dinner on a corresponding train leaving Spokane at 3:45 p. m. The new schedule as arranged, will supply the most complete service ever furnished on the O. R. & N., as it provides increased service in Eastern Oregon, where it is greatly needed, and gives immediate connection with the Washington division at Pendleton. At this point there is a large interchange of traffic, on account of the various mining districts of Baker county, the Coeur d'Alene, the Republic and Kootenai mining camps; Portland is greatly benefited by this change, in as much as increased service is given from Eastern Oregon and Idaho.

No. 2 will arrive in Chicago at 9:30 a. m.; No. 6 at 7:45 a. m., as at present. The westbound train out of Chicago, corresponding with No. 2, is No. 1. This will arrive in Portland at 4:00 p. m. The train corresponding with the eastbound No. 6 is No. 3, out of Chicago. This will reach Portland at 7:30 a. m. Westbound train No. 1 will leave Chicago at 6:30 p. m. and Omaha at 8:30 a. m. the following day. The time will be reduced two hours and 45 minutes. No. 3 westbound train will leave Chicago at 10:30 p. m., and Omaha at 4:25, the next day.

The service on the Union Pacific on all these trains include Buffet-Smoking-Library cars, and dining cars. No. 6 will carry a daily ordinary sleeper to Kansas City, with change en route to ordinary to Chicago. Consult the nearest ticket agent for detailed information.

Notice to Bicycle Owners.

At the April term of the county court said court made the following order: "It is ordered that the Sheriff of Benton County, Oregon, be and he is hereby instructed to carry out the provisions of the law, and that from and after May 1st, 1900, the absence of the proper tag from any bicycle (except those in the hands of dealers for sale, and which have not been sold, loaned, traded, or in any manner previously disposed of), shall be considered prima facie evidence that the tax has not been paid; and that said sheriff seize, securely and safely hold all such bicycles until the levied tax and \$1 additional has been paid as a fine for such non-payment."
