TIMES ATTACK UNWARRANTED.

Mr. Thomas C. Catchings is a member of the lower house of congress from Mississippi. At the completion of his present term, he will have been in congress sixteen years. Mr. Catchings is not only a leading democrat of his state, but is the member on the river and harbor committee whose rank is first among the democratic members on that committee, and when the river and harbor bill is being considered by the house he is the democratic leader. The following is a true copy of his two letters about the conduct of Thos. H. Tongue for the improvement of Yaquina bay:

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, WASHINGTON, D. C., VICKSBURG, MISS., MAY 3, 1900. MY DEAR MR. TONGUE:— I beg to acknowledge your favor of the 28th ult. enclosing an extract from an editorial in Corvallis Times of April 18, 1900, and asking me to state what I know of your efforts in behalf of the Yaquina bay project.

There is no warrant whatever for the attack upon you by the Times. As a member of the committee on rivers and harbors, I personally know that you made every effort that any man could possibly have made to secure the improvement of Yaquina bay in accordance with the provision which had been made therefor before you were elected to congress. Your efforts were not only exceedingly earnest, but persistent and intelligent. Indeed you were very near being successful notwithstanding the fact that the committee on rivers and harbors were practically against the project, and notwithstanding the fact that it was condemned by the engineer corps. I know and take great pleasure in saying, that no man could have labored more earnestly and zealously and intelligently than you did in behalf of this project. I will go further and say that few men could have presented the case with as great strength. If I can say anything further in your defense against this attack, I will be more than willing to do so, for it is exceedingly unjust and unwarranted.

Mr. Alex. M. Dockery, whose signature to his letter copied below, is a member of congress from Missouri and is the first in rank of the democratic members on the committee on appropriations, and when the bill on appropriations is before the house for consideration Mr. Dockery is the leader of the house on the democratic side. Mr. Dockery led the contest against Yaquina bay when Mr. Tongue endeavored to secure an appropriation therefor, as an amendment to the appropriation bill. The following letter from Mr. Dockery shows his views as to Mr. Tongue's efforts for Yaquina bay:

GALLATIN, MO., MAY 4, 1900. HON. THOS. H. TONGUE, WASHINGTON, D. C. MY DEAR SIR:—

Replying to your favor of the 28th ultimo will say that I am quite familiar with the history of the legislation enacted and of the appropriations made for the improvement of Yaquina bay in your state.

I have repeatedly antagonized appropriations for this work because in my judgment, it is unworthy of improvement by the federal government. It seemed to me a further expenditure of money upon that bay would be but a waste of public money. In pressing this view upon the house, I have as you know, antagonized your views, not in any personal sense, but from a conviction of duty. It having been charged that you have betrayed the interests of the scheme for the improvement of Yaquina bay, I may say that to my personal knowledge you have at all times been active and zealous in the effort to secure the continuance of this work. I am a democrat and of course desire the election of some democrat from your congressional district, but I cannot refrain from stating the truth in respect to your attitude towards this improvement. It is not true that you have at any time betrayed the interests of the Yaquina bay improvement. I opposed the appropriation (successfully) because I thought it was a waste of the peoples money. You have at all times been just as earnest in endeavoring to press the other view upon congress.

New Train Service.

The double train service to be established between Portland and Chicago April 22nd, in which the O. R. & N., the Union Pacific and the Oregon Short Line are interested, will shorten the through time 11 hours. Train No. 2 leaving Portland at 9:15 a. m., beginning on the date named, will be known as the Chicago-Portland special. Its equipment will be new, making it fully the equal of any train now in service from the Pacific Coast to the East. It will consist of a mail-car, a baggage-car, a library-composite car, a first-class Pullman sleeper, a dining-car, two chair-cars, and a tourist sleeper. There will be but one change of cars to all eastern points. The full time will be three days through to Chicago, or four days and two hours to New York.

The second train, known as No. 6, will leave Portland at 6:20 p. m., connecting at East Portland, with the Southern Pacific overland train from San Francisco, and will carry through equipment to Chicago via the Union Pacific and the Chicago & Northeastern, and also the equipment for the Washington division of the O. R. & N., in connection with the Great Northern for St. Paul. This train will reach Spokane at 10 a. m. Dining-car will be furnished for breakfast into Spokane, and for dinner on a corresponding train leaving Spokane at 3:45 p. m. The new schedule as arranged, will supply the most complete service ever furnished on the O. R. & N., as it provides increased service in Eastern Oregon, where it is greatly needed, and gives immediate connection with the Washington division at Pendleton. At this point there is a large interchange of traffic, on account of the various mining districts of Baker county, the Coeur d'Alene, the Republic and Kootenai mining camps; Portland is greatly benefited by this change, in as much as increased service is given from Eastern Oregon and Idaho.

No. 2 will arrive in Chicago at 9:30 a. m.; No. 6 at 7:45 a. m., as at present. The westbound train out of Chicago, corresponding with No. 2, is No. 1. This will arrive in Portland at 4:00 p. m. The train corresponding with the eastbound No. 6 is No. 3, out of Chicago. This will reach Portland at 7:30 a. m. Westbound train No. 1 will leave Chicago at 6:30 p. m. and Omaha at 8:30 a. m. the following day. The time will be reduced two hours and 45 minutes. No. 3 westbound train will leave Chicago at 10:30 p. m., and Omaha at 12:30 p. m., the next day.

The service on the Union Pacific on all these trains include Buffet-Smoking-Library cars, and dining cars. No. 6 will carry a daily ordinary sleeper to Kansas City, with change en route to ordinary to Chicago.
