



The Dallas woolen mills have been moved from that city to Portland. Corvallis should see that the carriage factory doesn't follow suit.

The publication in the Oregonian of last week of the Glass letter and of the acknowledgements of Dresser on the senatorial situation in the legislature, was certainly one of the most peculiar movements ever witnessed in a political contest. The movement would certainly seem to have done much damage to Mr. Corbett's interests.

The contest in the legislature for United States senator resulted in the election of ex-Senator John H. Mitchell after a long and hard fought contest during the whole session of the legislature. The fight was a personal fight between ex-Senator W. H. Corbett and Mr. Mitchell. The cause of their disagreement is not wholly a new subject, but is of long duration. Both men made good senators and served their state well. This paper would have been satisfied with Mr. Corbett's election if he had been elected with the republican members of the legislature unassisted by combinations with democrats. While this paper recognizes that Mr. Mitchell represented all parts of Oregon well and without slighting one section to benefit another it would have been more appropriate and seemed more like the action of republicans if he could have been elected without a combination assisted by democrats.

Wheat Pests.

As the growing season of crops approaches one often hears conjectures expressed regarding the probability, or possibility, of pests creating the havoc in our fields during the coming season that they did last year. At a recent meeting of the farmers in Forest Grove, Prof. A. B. Cordley, of the O. A. C., gave the following interesting account of the Hessian fly and its habits:

The Hessian fly is the greatest wheat pest in the world, and destroyed probably 40,000,000 bushels of wheat in the United States alone. It has but recently made its appearance in the Northwest. In 1891 Prof. French got some wheat in the vicinity of Scappoose which was infested with the Hessian fly, since which time it has made its appearance in several localities. However, it is not general in the Willamette valley. In order to learn how to combat this insect we must learn something of its habits. It is about one-tenth the size of a mosquito and one may take it for a gnat. In Ohio it makes its appearance in August and September, deposits its eggs and disappears between the 20th of September and the 20th of October. The eggs are yellow and elongated. From these eggs a colorless maggot is hatched, which crawls down to near the base of the plant where he lives upon the life of the plant. He remains in this condition, which they usually call the flax seed condition, till the following spring. In April or May another brood emerges which deposits its eggs on the first or second joint above the ground and absorbs the nourishment of the plant. If there is much rain there may be three broods. Sometimes the wheat when attacked looks bright and green and really more thrifty than that which is not attacked. This is due to its effort to overcome the attack. If the wheat is examined carefully you will find that the central shoot is killed. The principal injury is done by the fall brood, although here in this country this brood may not be so injurious. The second or the spring brood causes from 75 to 90 per cent of the wheat to break down. As to the remedies, insecticides cannot be used

to advantage. The fall grain should be sown after the eggs are deposited. The burning of the stubble will kill many of them.

Confessed His Guilt.

A little boy's conscience is a power for good in many ways. It sometimes keeps him from doing a wrong, but a misdeed once committed is oft-times so magnified that he breaks down under the strain and confesses. The Yaquina Post tells of a recent case of this kind, as follows: Jeddy Peco, aged 14, and and Charles Mulkey, aged about 19, were brought before A. C. Tammison, J. P., at Harlan in this county, on the 19th inst., upon the charge of stealing \$40 from T. Bradzon. Jeddy Peco, upon examination acknowledged taking two twenty dollar pieces from Bradzon's pants, while Charles Mulkey plead not guilty; and there being insufficient evidence to convict him, acquittal followed. Deputy District Attorney Swope, appeared for the state. Jeddy was brought to this city on the 20th, and in all probability will be sent to the Reform School.

Prosecuting witness in the above case, T. Bradzon, then appeared before Justice Tammison on the charge of stealing sheep, Margaret Hart being the prosecuting witness. As the evidence elicited was not sufficient, in the court, to convict Bradzon, he was acquitted.

If the little boy, Jeddy, had plead "not guilty," he too, would have escaped, as we are informed, there was not evidence sufficient, save his own to convict him.
