



NO NEGRÓES IN THIS TOWN.

One Kentucky Village from Which the Calvert City, in Marshall County, in Kentucky, is one of the few places in the world that has effectually solved the race problem. Not a negro is to be found within a radius of a dozen miles, and the negro is yet to be discovered who has any permanent desire to come

To threaten a negro with Calvert City is to bring before his frightened vision pictures of death more horrible than by lynching.

The peaceable, law-abiding spirit that prevails in the little Kentucky town is swiftly banished when a negro appears. If he keeps going he is not colested, provided he attends strictly to his own affairs and does nothing to provoke the ever-alert hostility of the esidents. But he can neither take up his abode there nor remain over all night, and so disastrous have been all past attempts to break this unwritten, but none the less, stringent law, that no negro would to-day dare to move into Calvert City and announce his intention of remaining.

The town itself is a small place of a few hundred inhabitants, situated on the Illinois Central railroad, only a dozen miles from Paducah, the metro-

polls of Southwest Kentucky. The intense hatred of the negro dates back twenty years or more. Few profess to know its origin, and many claim that it was born in the people, but some tled there. The aversion of the people shed, were made to expel the mismated couples, and eventually they were driven away.

This aroused the bitterest hostility among the negroes, and the white people soon grew to so hate the sight of one that every negro was aultimately run out of the vicinity, and one has never been known to live in those parts since.

In recent years there has been no serious trouble, but it is estimated that no less than ten or a dozen negroes who had settled in the neighborhood have been shot from ambush or otherwise mysteriously killed.

This reprehensible means of exterminating them, however, was always adopted as a last resort, and no one was ever punished for relieving the community of their presence.

Old Servants' Prizes.

On the Austrian emperor's fete day a umber of prizes were distributed to ervants who have been a long time in the same situation. The prize was about £15 in each case. First on the list was a valet, aged 71, who had served forty-six consecutive years in one family. The second was a nurse, 72 years old, who had served forty-two years in one family; a maid of all work, 77 years old, who had served forty-on years in a nunnery, came next; then an under cook, aged 51, who had served thirty-nine years in a boy's or-

There was a maid of all work, aged 76, who had served thirty-nine years in one family; a kitchen maid, 69 years old who had been in the household of Princess Clementine of Coburg for thirty-nine years, came next, and then, 68 years old, came one who had been a ty-eight years.

Altogether there were twenty-one names on the list, and the shortest term of service was thirty years. Our cor respondent remarks that the mistresse of these good people deserved prizes too, for they must surely have lovable tempers if they can go on being waited upon by ladies' maids and maids of all work of the ages named.

Siberian Rivers Well Lighted. One of the most remarkable features of the Russian navigation of Siberian rivers consists in the thorough way in which each verst of the navigable 3,000 or more is lighted. There is always a amppost in sight, and these are painted white or red, so as to be easily discernible during the day. This must necessitate the employment of at least 1,000 lightkeepers, who also patrol and sound the river's depth within their respective beats. Each isolated woodpile must have its guardians, who live near by in a log hut or two.

An Exceptional Lake An interesting exploration of Lake Tanganvika and the country north of t, finished recently, revealed the fact that while certain sea molluscs are found in this lake, it is the only one of all the large African lakes in which such phenomena are observed. This lake is only a short distance, some eighty miles, from the great Congo ba sin, much of which, without doubt, was once covered by the sea.

Bicyclists in France. There are in France-chiefly in Parisover half a million registered bicyclists. In 1804 the number was 203,026 and in 1899 483,414. Each one pays a tax and carries a license. The above number does not include motor-cycles and mo tor cars, which are far more plentiful in France than in England. Motorcycles are to be used by postmen for collecting letters in Paris.

Female School Teachers. Women are rapidly displacing men as teachers in the schools of New York. During the last year there was a decrease of 217 in the number of men em ployed, while the number of women eachers increased 1.073.
