

MORAL ISSUES.

In every community there are those who see, or think they see, a moral issue involved in what ever becomes a matter of public concernment. It may be but the selection of a pound-master, or deciding whether or not certain public improvements shall be undertaken; these good people come forward with their grave questions of morality and endeavor to inject them, as it were, into what is really only a plain business proposition, having no moral aspect whatever. 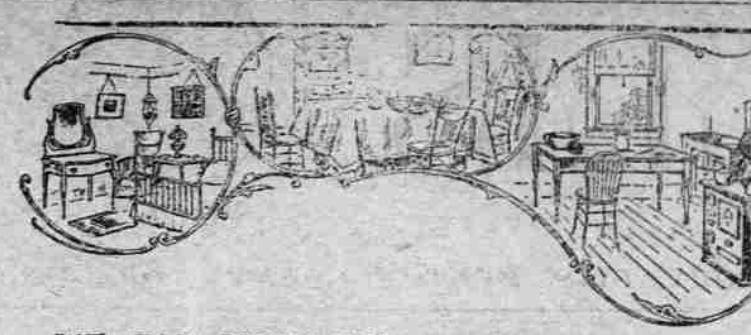
