

SYMPATHETIC STRIKES.

Strikes have been necessary in the past and may be in the future. It has frequently occurred that a body of workmen could obtain their just rights in no other way than by a suspension of work.

What is true of individuals is equally true of bodies of workmen. They have a clear, indisputable right to refuse to work. They also have the right to hold meetings, to use moral suasion with fellow-craftsmen, in short, to do anything that may be done within the law by any other body of citizens to carry their contention to successful termination.

Workmen, conducting their strikes on these lines are always accorded a patient hearing, and if they have any fair semblance of right and justice on their side they may be assured of the support of public sentiment, without which they cannot hope to win.

Through the sympathetic strike trade is obstructed, the wheels of commerce stilled, and loss, deprivation, and not infrequently suffering, are inflicted upon the helpless and innocent, upon those who are in no measure responsible for the causes of the strike and who can have no interest whatever in its objects.

Already we see manifestations of this purpose even in the ranks of labor. The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers has a larger degree of public confidence and respect than any other body of organized labor, not alone because its members are intelligent, courageous, manly men, but because they uniformly refuse to interfere in contentions which at best only remotely concern them.

Labor should free itself from the heedless tyranny of its leaders or the state will intervene. Boycotting, picketing, intimidation, have been declared infractions of just law and so punished. The courts have ample powers to prohibit and to punish any course of action so hurtful to the people, so fraught with wide-reaching evil to all classes as the sympathetic strike.
