

PLAUSIBLE BUT INEFFICIENT.

For several years a commission has been engaged in codifying the United States Statutes. It has drafted a bill which congress will be asked to enact for the purpose of providing greater security for the president.

This legislation is necessary because our laws give the president no more nor different protection than they accord the humblest and most obscure citizen.

It is easily seen that such a law that this bill contemplates would afford the president no greater protection than he now has.

The only attempt to reach anarchists through the provisions of this bill is that if it can be shown the assassin of the president had associates who counseled and encouraged the assassin or aided in perpetrating it they shall be deemed equally guilty as the principal.

The case of Herr Most furnishes an illustration of this. Before an inferior court he was, on trial, convicted of publishing an incendiary article.

This bill emphasizes the necessity for a federal statute defining such offences to be crimes against the government, to be classified as acts of war and punished as such.

In the six hundred and sixty-second year after the founding of the City a civil war was first set on foot at Rome. In the same year also began the Mithradatic War.

Mithradates, who was king of Pontus and held Armenia Minor and all the Black Sea on the route along the Bosphorus, at first wished to expel Nicomedes, the friend of the Roman people, from Bithynia, and sent word to the Senate that he would make war on it on account of the wrongs which he had suffered.
