

THE FARMER BENEFITED.

It is asserted by at least a part of the press which is opposed to the ship subsidy bill that it will be of no benefit to the American farmer.

There can be little question that our farmers are now making their products, for the greater part, as cheaply as possible. This is especially true of grain production. A bushel of wheat is now produced as cheaply as it is possible to produce it.

We practically have no merchant marine engaged in the foreign trade. We do scarcely more than 5 per cent of our foreign carrying trade; nineteen-twentieths of it is conducted by foreign vessels and controlled by foreign ship owners.

Herein we see the main reason why the price of American grown wheat is fixed at Liverpool. Were its carriage in American hands its price would be fixed in San Francisco or New York.

With the carrying trade in the hands of foreigners it is but natural they should strive to make wheat as cheap as possible to foreign consumers, while getting their own charges for carriage; hence they are always beats in the American market.

The producer who controls his own means of transportation always has a decided advantage over one who depends upon others for such means. With our own merchant marine we would keep in our own hands the \$200,000,000 we now pay annually to foreign ship owners, but the subsidy will never exceed \$9,000,000.

View the matter as we may, it is certain that with our own ships we shall not only save the money we now pay away for carriage, but we shall more easily control the price at which we sell our products. This will benefit the American producer, and none more than the farmer.

Since we in no case shall sell Europe a bushel of wheat more than she needs we should certainly make every effort to carry all she may need of us.

Book I—A Literal Translation by C. MacLennan, Ph. D. Vv. 285-291—Agamemnon's Reply to Nestor:

But, indeed, if it is thy wish, come, make a trial [of me], in order that these [i. e. the chiefs about Agamemnon] also shall know: quickly shall thy black blood flow around my spear."

For Registration.

Election times will soon be upon us again and this reminds the voter that he must again enroll himself on the register in order to be entitled to vote. Speaking of this, the Albany Herald says:

The various county clerks of this state are now engaged in getting or looking after supplies for the registration departments of their offices. The registration of voters begins in January, and continues until May. A registration book is required for each election precinct, of which there are from 15 to 20 in the smaller counties to 70 in Multnomah, and various blanks and affidavit forms are also necessary.

Voters must register for general election, and consequently all those who registered in 1900 must come forward again. Young men who have just become of age, and new residents, all must register. Precinct maps must be prepared in order that the clerks may be able to register each elector in the precinct in which he resides.
