

SELF-APPOINTED CANDIDATES.

A glance over the state indicates that political movements are assuming active conditions. In a form of government said to "be of the people," one would naturally expect such active operations to spring from the people, rather than from the officeholder or the constant seeker after public official position.

After such investigation at the present time, one learns of several persons who have determined, each in his own estimation, that they are the most fit and proper persons to be elected to the United States senate, and each in turn has solicited such friends as he can command in each county to enlist their efforts in working up public sentiment to nominate certain individuals as candidates for election to the next legislature.

The mass of the people are anxious that men be nominated and elected to the legislature who have permanent interests in the county from which they are elected, and particularly that they be not pledged to higher officials. Self-seekers after official position, pledged to some aspirant to the United States senate, are not thought well of by the people generally.

The four or five sessions of the legislature last past, have enacted few laws of any material benefit to the public, while several unjust laws have passed which would better not have been enacted. Much of the state's time and money was expended in holding up the legislature to decide which of two or three men should be elected United States senator, while needed legislation was being neglected.

The great political quarrel which has been progressing in and about Portland for the last 30 years has assumed such proportions as seriously to effect all other parts of the state. No doubt emissaries can now be found in every out-lying county seat in Oregon, setting up the preliminary machinery to nominate and elect members to the legislature who will support and vote for prearranged candidates for United States senator.

For these reasons, and others good and sufficient, of which there is not room nor time here to make mention, the people may do well to look to localities in different parts of the state for candidates for the United States senate. There are other localities in Oregon, that have important interests requiring attention, and when our senators all come from Portland it is difficult to get improvements continued unless the road leads to Portland. While the GAZETTE has a just pride in Oregon's chief city and its possibilities, it, nevertheless, likes to see other localities grow proportionately and meet with just recognition. Some of these in times past have been ignored because the highway to be improved did not lead to Portland. Twenty years ago, it was difficult to elect a man from Portland to the United States senate, other parts of the state were so strongly opposed. Nor could such a man be elected until he made it known that he would treat fairly improvements in other localities of the state. There is no doubt that certain short-sighted interests at Portland took a liberal hand in causing the suspension of improvements at Yaquina harbor. If the friends of Yaquina bay should again organize to obtain justice, they could fight the prospects of some candidates who now

make formidable pretensions. It will be difficult to elect to the legislature men who are presumed from past affiliations, or hard writing on the wall, to be pledged to self-appointed candidates to the United States senate. For, heretofore, such prearranged subversion of the people's will have led to hold-ups of the legislature, with which the general public is not well pleased.

The Salem Journal is again bidding for cheap notoriety. A recent circular letter issued from the sanctum of that publication, virtually asks the press of the state to give the Journal a lot of free advertising. In a few instances the request was complied with, but the majority were on to Herr Hofer. The Roseburg Plaindealer took this view of it: "The editor of the Eugene Journal, who has been there, says the matter of salaries and fees of state officials is not the serious one with Oregon. The difference would not change the total of receipts and expenses much. The great items are the grafts voted by the state legislature and it is an interesting fact that when Brother Hofer, of the Salem Journal, was in the legislature he voted for all of them."
