

LATIN AMERICAN TRADE.

At a recent meeting of the New York Credit Men's Association, one of the speakers discussing our commercial expansion spoke at considerable length of reciprocity. After declaring that reciprocity as a general policy is not feasible and describing Europe's trade hostility to us he calls attention to the trade relations which should exist between the United States and Mexico, Central and South America. He asserts that the Monroe Doctrine in its inception was both political and commercial in its purpose. We have enforced its political purpose at enormous cost to ourselves. We should now enforce its commercial feature. England, Germany and France are exploiting this trade which from every consideration should be ours, but of which we have only a small fraction. Reciprocity is the agent which we should employ to bring these nations into exclusive trade relations with us. He would negotiate treaties with the governments of Latin America establishing "preferential customs duties between the contracting parties, each party to be at liberty to make similar treaties with any colony or sovereignty in the Western Hemisphere, but not with any European nation."

Of course if this were done we should quickly drive the trade of all Europe off this hemisphere. It might be of some interest to us, however, what Europe would then do. We cannot control the commerce of the East. Notwithstanding we have the Philippines and have desirable trade relations with Japan and China, Europe could easily close the "open door" to these nations, and it is reasonable to suppose she would promptly do so.

"America for Americans" looks well on paper and tickles our vanity, but we will hardly elect to carry it into our commercial relations with our southern neighbors.

It is true, if sentiment determined trade relations, we should have preferred rights to the trade of Latin America; but commerce is less actuated by sentimental considerations than the woman who chooses a seventh husband.

We should, however, put forth greater effort to control trade with Mexico, Central and South America. They are our nearest neighbors. Already American capital is largely invested there, and American enterprise and energy are developing the resources of several of these countries, especially of Mexico. Our merchants and traders should see to it that their inertia does not permit Europe to gather the major part of a growing and desirable trade with these countries.

It is pleasing to recall that once we had a statesman whom we may justly designate as the father of American trade reciprocity. He pointed out the possibilities of this Latin American commerce, and planned to gather it to ourselves through reciprocity treaties. He was truly pan-American, but he was opposed by some of the men who now become frantic before the fact that Europe controls the larger part of that trade.

Since the day of J. G. Blaine we have expanded our territorial possessions and now place the products of our factories in competition with those of Europe in the markets of the world.

Our commerce will expand beyond even the dreams of the present. Were we a Doctor of Divinity we should probably declare it is part of the divine purpose for christianizing the world, but being only a country editor we shall content ourselves by saying it is "our manifest destiny."

Will Interest Teachers.

The State Board of Education has just made a ruling which will be of interest to every teacher in this state. It establishes a precedent, which will cause some trouble in the future, unless the board is more explicit in compelling questions for examination, than it was in the present instance. The decision follows:

In the matter of the petition of Mrs. Jennie S. Pratt for a special examination in mental arithmetic to complete her examination for a primary certificate. The matter coming on for hearing on a final hearing, on the fourth day of January, 1902, upon petition and objection thereto, of the County Board of Examiners of Benton County, Bryan, Esq., appearing for the petitioner and W. E. Yates for objector; and the petition was considered on the evidence of the witnesses presented, and also on the

written statement filed herein, and having argument of counsel and taken under consideration being fully advised, the State Board of Education finds as follows:

That the said petitioner duly presented herself before the County Board of Examiners of Benton County, August 15-16, 1901, as an applicant for a primary certificate; that said petitioner passed in all the branches required by law for a primary certificate; that said County Board of Examiners did not issue a primary certificate owing to the failure of the petitioner to obtain the minimum standing in arithmetic required by law. The State Board of Education further finds that a question arose during the progress of said examination as to whether or not said petitioner should be examined in written or mental arithmetic; and that, in consequence of such question it was mutually agreed between the petitioner and objector to submit such question to the State Superintendent for his opinion and that in the meantime said petitioner was to take the examination on the subject of written arithmetic; and, in case the State Superintendent gave it as his opinion that the examination should be on the subject of mental arithmetic, the petitioner was to take the examination on mental arithmetic on the date set for mental arithmetic; and that the State Superintendent rendered an opinion to the effect that the examination should be on the subject of written arithmetic and not mental; that, in accordance with the agreement between the petitioner and the objector, petitioner was not entitled to an examination in mental arithmetic but that the examination already taken in written arithmetic should be the legal examination for a primary certificate; and that the petitioner did not at that time nor at any time during the examination object to such examination in written arithmetic being taken as the examination in arithmetic for a primary certificate; and the County Board of Examiners, under the circumstances, was justified, therefore in view of the foregoing, the prayer of the petitioner, that she be granted an examination in mental arithmetic to complete her examination for a primary certificate, is not granted.

It, however, appearing to the State Board of Education from the evidence submitted that the program sent out by the Board and published by the county superintendent of Benton County was somewhat uncertain as to whether applicants should be examined on the subject of mental or written arithmetic, for which uncertainty the State Board of Education assumes all blame, it is, therefore, hereby ordered that the said Jennie S. Pratt be allowed to appear before the County Board of Examiners of Benton County during the next regular examination for primary certificate to be held in February, 1902, and at such time write on the subject of arithmetic on such questions as shall be prepared on such subject by the State Board of Education for applicants for primary certificates and that her standing in all the other branches, secured during the examination in August, 1901, be allowed to stand as the regular examination in such branches; and that the County Board of Examiners for Benton County is hereby authorized to issue to her a primary certificate dated from February, 1902; provided, that in the February examination, 1902, her standing in arithmetic, together with the standings secured in August, 1901, in the other branches shall legally entitle her to such primary certificate.
