It is our boast that our public school system cultivates and develops this democratic spirit by placing all boys on a level and teaching them that honesty, industry, self-reliance and moral worth, joined to a glowing spirit of patriotism form by far a more desirable list of assets than paternal stocks and bonds, power and place.

HOMER'S ILLAD.

Book II—A Literal Translation by C. MacLean, Ph. D.

Vv. 48-83—Agamemnon, having communicated his plan to the Elders, calls the forces to an assembly:

Now the goddess, Dawn, ascended the lofty Olympus to announce the light to Zeus and to the other immortals; and the [Agam.] ordered clear-voiced heralds to summon the long-haired Achaean to an assembly.

Then he first constituted a council of noble-minded Elders near the ship of Nestor, the Pylus-born king. Having called them together, he prepared the prudent plan [which he afterward unfolds]:

"Hearken, O friends; A divine dream came to me in my sleep during the ambrosial night, and he resembled most exactly the divine Nestor in respect to features, size and form. And he stood right over my head, and addressed to me [the following] speech:

"D'est thou sleep, O son of Atreus—that fiery-hearted knight? It does not become a counsel-giving man to sleep all night long—[a man] to whom people are entrusted and who has so many cares. But do thou now hear me quickly. For I am a messenger for thee from Zeus, who, although he is far away from thee, greatly grieves for thee and pities thee. He commanded thee to arm the long-haired Achaean with all haste. For now thou mayest, if thou wilt put forth the effort, capture the wide-wayed city of the Trojans. For the immortals who inhabit the Olympian Halls are no longer divided in opinion [touching the destruction of Troy]. For Hera by entreating has bent them all, and for the Trojans, whose are destined from Zeus. But do thou keep [this message] in thy mind."

Having thus spoken he flew away, and refreshing sleep left me. Now come ye [and] if possible we will arm the sons of the Achaean. But I will first test them with words, which is right, and will order them to flee with the many-oared ships; but restrain ye them with words—

At one point, another at another." Having indeed thus spoken he sat down, and there stood up among them Nestor, who was then king of Sandy Pylus. He, being well disposed, addressed the assembly and said:

"O friends, leaders and rulers of the Argives, had told his dream, we might say it is not true and we might reject it all the more [as the Dream-god is not trustworthy]; but he who claims to be the bravest of the Achaean saw him. But come ye, [and] if possible, we will arm the sons of the Achaean."

So, having thus spoken, he began to go away from the Council, and they, the sceptre-bearing kings, thereupon arose and obeyed the shepherd of the people.
