

INDEPENDENT JOURNALISM.

The evolution of the independent press has been a slow and somewhat painful process in the history of American journalism. Previous to the close of the civil war there was comparatively little independent journalism. In the religious world men were credulous, and in the domain of politics bitter partisans, each struggling for the advancement and ultimate triumph of his own creed, his own party, his own faction, and having no sort of use for any person or agency which was not in harmony with his views and purposes.

Today the independent press is a mighty power, an active and efficient agent in setting up higher, purer, nobler ideals in creed and party platform and in persuading men to come up to these higher levels. It is not claiming too much to ascribe the greater and most desirable part of our religious, political and social development to the influence of a fearless, intelligent, independent public press. It is no longer possible to excommunicate or to drive out of the party the independent journalist. He espouses the principles of his party because he honestly believes them to be most wise, most practical, most beneficent. Nothing causes him to lose sight of these. Factions may wrangle, selfishness may strike out, corruption may honey-comb, rings may dominate, but he stays with the principles of the party and rebukes faction, decries corruption, defies bossism.

No creed may hope always to escape schism, nor party to be without some manifestation of factional strife. Long as Nature bestows but a modicum of grey matter and moral perception upon some men there will be schismatics and factionists. These are no better able to appreciate independent journalism than were their kind a century ago.

Fortunately, a chief through the influence of an independent press working within party lines such men soon run their course and are relegated to the rear.

It is thus that parties are purified, rejuvenated and sent forward and upward toward better ideals. It is thus that temporary defeat, unpleasant though it be, produces the wisdom which illuminates the way to the ultimate triumph of civic righteousness.

HOMER'S ILLIAD.

Book II—A Literal Translation by C. Maclean, Ph. D.

Vv. 211-277—Therites, his insolence and his punishment:

Then, indeed, the others sat, and were restrained on the seats; but Therites, [a man of] unmeasured speech, alone continued to brawl, and he, mark you, knew in his mind words unseemly and many, so as vainly, and not according to propriety, to contend with kings, but [to say] what seemed to him to be laughable to the Argives. He [was] the ugliest man [who] came under the walls of Troy. He was bandy-legged, and lame in one foot; and those curved shoulders of his bent over his breast; and on top he was in respect to his head peaked, and woolly hair grew sparse upon it. He was most hateful especially to Achilles and to Odysseus; for he was wont to revile these two. Then, again, screaming sharply, he rehearsed reproaches against the brave Agamemnon. And naturally the Achaeans were violently enraged against this one [i. e. at Agam. on account of their late disappointment], and he vexed at heart. And shouting afar he [i. e. Therites] reviled Agamemnon in a speech [as follows]:

"O son of Atreus! Whom and why dost thou now again blame and what dost thou seek? The tents are of thee full of money, and many choice women

are in the tents, [women] whom we Achaeans are wont to give to thee first of all, when we capture a city. Or art thou yet in want of money—[money] which some one of the Trojan knights will bring Troy as a ransom for his son—[a son] whom I or some other man of the Achaeans, having taken captive, will lead away? Or dost thou desire a new concubine, in order that thou mayst unite with [her] in love—[a concubine] whom thou mayst have for thyself alone? It is not seemingly that thou who art a leader shouldst bring the sons of the Achaeans into misfortune.

"O my good fellows, cowardly dastards, Achaeans men! Even hitherward with our ships we shall sail, and this man we will suffer to enjoy his honors here in Troy, until he shall know whether we are or whether we are not of use in respect to anything [to him] who even now has dishonored Achilles, a man much braver than he himself. For he seized and has in his possession his prize of honor, he himself having taken her away. But wrath is not at all in the heart of Achilles, but he is yielding. Otherwise, son of Atreus, thou wouldst now insult for the very last time."

Thus reproaching Agamemnon, the shepherd of the people, spoke Therites. And near to him quickly stood the mighty Achilles, and looking at him askance he rebuked him in a harsh speech [as follows]:

"Therites, thou endles prattler, though thou art a very sonorous orator, restrain thyself, and do not desire alone to revile kings. For I say that [of all] as many as went along with the son of Atreus to Troy not another mortal was more cowardly than thee. For this reason thou shouldst not harangue, having kings in thy mouth; and thou shouldst neither bring accusations against them nor the watching for their return. Nor do we at all yet know clearly how these matters shall end [i. e. be], whether we the sons of the Achaeans shall return home honorably or dishonorably. [For this reason sittest thou now reviling the son of Atreus, Agamemnon, the shepherd of the people, because the Dana warriors are wont to give to him very many gifts. And thou art haranguing offensively.]

"But I shall speak out to thee, and this too will be a thing accomplished. If ever again I find thee playing the fool as just now in this manner, then may the head no longer rest above the shoulders of Odysseus, if I do not take thee and strip off from thee thy garments—both thy cloak and thy tunic, and whatsoever covers thy nakedness, and I shall send thee thyself weeping to the swift ships, after having driven thee with pitiful blows from the agora."

Thus he spoke, and with the staff [i. e. the ancestral sceptre] he smote him in the back and shoulders. Then he bent over and a big tear escaped him, and a bleeding weal rose from his back under the golden sceptre, and he sat and feared, and seized with pain he, looking foolish, wiped away a tear.

Then they [i. e. Achaeans], though deeply grieved laughed merrily at him; and each one glancing at the other—his neighbor—began to speak as follows, "Can this be! Indeed before now Odysseus accomplished a thousand excellent things, first suggesting good plans, then rousing to the battle, but this that he has now done is by far the best he has ever done among the Argives, since he has restrained this insolent, babbling fellow from haranguing. I don't think his proud mind will urge him back again to upbraid kings with reproachful words."
