They are earth-born; not children of the skies. No halo encircles their brows; their garments are not made of snow. A good hat, and a suit of clothes, part wool and something less than a yard wide, purchased from our local merchants, pleases them better and is more becoming.

No, gentlemen, the Benton County Republican ticket is not composed of seraphs nor cherubims. They were drawn from the ranks of the voters of the county, and are regarded as representative men who will honestly and capably administer the offices to which they are elected. That is all.

PASSED BY THE HOUSE.

The plank in the platform promulgated by the republican state convention relating to this subject is what we had a right to expect, an insistent demand that congress pass the Mitchell-Kahn exclusion bill. All parties, especially on the Pacific coast, favor such legislation.

Formerly the measure was believed, in the eastern states, to be merely one of local character relating mainly to the Pacific states, and largely the expression of racial prejudice and political demagoguery. More intelligent and correct views now prevail. In spite of a few sentimental humanitarians and religious enthusiasts such as General Howard the people east and west regard unrestricted Chinese immigration as pregnant with grave dangers to our social life and ultimately debauching our whole national life, physically, morally, religiously and politically. The people of the East now admit that we of the Pacific coast having been long in close contact with Chinese immigrants have had ocular demonstration of the demoralizing, baneful influences of such immigration, and so are better qualified to determine what measures are required to deal with the whole subject.

Much of this changed attitude of public sentiment in the Atlantic and Gulf states is due to the efforts of senators and representatives in congress from the western states. Most conspicuous of these is our own Senator Mitchell. His recent speech before the senate in support of the exclusion bill was a careful and thorough analysis of its provisions, a complete portrayal of the evils sure to attend the admission of large numbers of Chinese as learned from actual observation, and an eloquent and earnest appeal to the patriotism of the senate to enact the bill. Nothing more could have been said nor said more effectively.

The bill, with amendments making it yet more drastic, has passed the house by a handsome majority. It remains to be seen what the senate may do with these, but there can be little doubt the bill will become a law.

Organized labor demands the legislation and there appears to be little real opposition to the measure in either house.

HOMER'S ILLIAD.

Book II—A Literal Translation by C. MacLean, Ph. D. Vv. 441-483. The Army goes to battle:

Thus he spoke, and Agamemnon king of men did not disobey him; (not) at once ordered clear-voiced heralds to summon the long-haired Achaeans to an assembly. The former heralded, the latter very quickly assembled. And the sons of Atreus and his attendants, the Zeus-nourished kings, rushed madly (hither and thither) arranging them, and the bright-eyed Athena among them, holding the precious shield, ever new and imperishable, from which a hundred tassels all gold float, all well-plaited and each with a hecatomb (i. e. a hundred cattle). With this (the shield) she, flashing forth here and there, rushed through the people of the Achaeans urging them to go, and she infused strength into the heart of each (one) (strength) to unceasingly war and fight. Now to them immediately became sweeter than to return home in the hollow ships to their dear native land. As a destructive fire consumes a vast forest on the summit of a mountain, and the brightness shines afar, so the gleam from the divine armor of these, as they are advancing, all shining through the upper air, reach heaven. And of these, as numerous flocks of flying birds, geese, cranes, long-necked swans, on the Asian meadow, on both sides of the streams of Kayster, here and there flying, sporting with their wings, while they alight with a loud noise, and the meadow resounds, so numerous tribes of these (the Achaeans) rushed forth from ships and from tents to the Scamandrian Plain, and the ground resound terribly under the feet both of them (the men) and of the horses. Now countless numbers, as many as the leaves and flowers in their season, halted on the flowery meadow of the Scamander.

As numerous swarms of clustering flies which continually hover about the sheepcote in the season of spring, when milk overflows the pans, so numerous were the long-haired Achaeans who, rushing impetuously (to battle) against the Trojans, took their stand on the plain to tear them to pieces. And these, as the herdsmen easily separate the scattered herds of goats, when they mingle in the pasture, so did the commanders divide and arrange them here and there (in companies) to go to battle, and among them king Agamemnon as to his eyes and head resembling Zeus the wielder of the thunderbolt, as to his waist (resembling) Mars, and as to his breast (resembling) Poseidon (See Hamlet 314. 55 ff.). As in the herd the bull is greatly distinguished above all, for he is pre-eminent among collected cattle; such on that day did Zeus make the son of Atreus—distinguished among many and pre-eminent among warriors.
