COMPLETED THE TICKET.

The Republican County Central Committee met in this city yesterday and completed the excellent ticket named at the recent county convention. For county judge the committee selected C. E. Woodson, one of the most popular and able attorneys in this city. No better selection could have been made. Theo. Wellsler was prevailed upon to accept the nomination for treasurer, and all republicans will endorse this act of the committee. For justice of the peace of the Corvallis precincts, Harold Strong was chosen, and O. J. Treese was nominated for constable. Believing that on account of his fitness and the fact that in the nature of things Mr. S. N. Wilkins is the proper person to fill the office of coroner, the committee named him for that office. His election is assured.

No ticket ever presented to the voters of this county has received the careful consideration accorded the one running at the head of this column, and none other was ever more worthy of support.

NOTHING NEW.

The democrats of Oregon have given their platform to the world and named their candidates for public office. The platform is characteristically democratic. Nothing is found upon which to base a real live issue, either in the conduct of affairs of the state or of those larger affairs concerning the nation. The republican party has been in power, republican measures have been applied and so intelligently administered that no sort of foothold remains for democrats. Nothing remains for them but to assume that position for which long practice has best fitted them—mere negation. The democratic party today is but a negative force. It is reasonable to suppose, and it is charitable to assume that in the democratic fold are yet some men able to see, quick to name, courageous enough to accept any real issue presenting itself in the attitude of the republican party on any question of public policy or administration. That they have not done so is conclusive evidence there is no occasion for it. True, they prate much of the inefficiency and extravagance of the republican party. They set up a man of straw in the Philippines, proceed to demolish it, then declare what they would do, and lo! it is just what the republican party and administration is doing so intelligently, so successfully as to excite the wonder and approval of the civilized world. The fight with the straw man deceives, misleads no one.

Their plank on irrigation of arid lands is identical with the republican purpose as expressed by president Roosevelt. Their utterance concerning trusts, corporations and combines is the silliestrodomontade. The people well know that all the legislation controlling these is given by the republican party, and that republican officers even now are earnestly enforcing the laws so supplied.

Touching state affairs the platform clamors for an official salary law, for initiative and referendum and for other measures set forth more incisively in the republican platform. Of course republican extravagance is arraigned in scathing language, and the people promised a wise, economical

and business administration. Then with their usual glaring inconsistency they nominate for chief executive, not a trained business man, not one who has shown any great force of character, not one who knows the people because he is of them, knows them and believes in them, but a lawyer, a well-dressed, suave and cultured gentleman of good standing in kid-gloved society, but who has never accomplished any of those things which are compassed through energy, great activity, persevering purpose and unflattering courage. Mr. Chamberlain is an eminently decent and respectable gentleman, with kindly, somewhat willowy disposition who has yet to learn to say "no" with all its force and meaning.

Who looks for that rare jewel, consistency, will not find it in the democratic camp. Farmers, artisans, tradesmen, the whole people, will readily see the difference between a nice, well-groomed, society man, and a man who does things because he knows how they should be done.

The contrast all through the ticket simply strengthens the republican ticket and leaves no doubt of its election.
