SUCCESS THE MEASURE.

We form our estimate of men not by the number of years they have lived, nor by what they proclaim of themselves, but by what they have done, or honestly attempted to do. Success is the great touch stone of individual character; not that all who deserve success achieve it, but because none achieve without deserving it. By the same rule we shall form our estimate of parties. If we eliminate men and platforms—things right in their own proper relations—and carefully consider the value of what parties have accomplished we find no difficulty in making an intelligent choice as between them.

This divests politics of all offensive personalities, prevents displays of mere partisan rancor and enable men to reason dispassionately, logically and correctly. The republican party invokes the application of this rule to itself and would apply it to the opposition. What of value has the republican party achieved? What has been the fruitage of its principles, policies, measures and administration? Away back at its birth it opposed the extension of human slavery. For more than a generation slavery has been extinct and our entire population rejoices it is so.

It resolved the American Union should be preserved. The air is yet vibrating to the shouts with which South Carolina welcomed her president—the president of seventy million freemen living under one government, revering one flag. It declared for protection to American industries and labor. Prosperity followed, and we have become a great industrial giant supplying our own demands and offering the world our rapidly growing surplus. Tens of thousands toil on farm, at forge and loom rejoice because of this policy and are proud to be known as republicans.

It determined there is in truth but one standard for measure of value, adopted that, and declared every dollar of our currency should conform to that standard so that its purchasing power should equal that of any other and all equal the highest standard. The American dollar is a dollar of stable value; the credit of the government never stood so high and financial confidence never was so positive as now.

It accepts the unselfish, self-sacrificing duties and responsibilities cast upon us by an overruling Providence through the exigencies of war and our flag floats over far off islands to whose millions we are giving Saxon law and order and fitting for the duties of self government.

Wherever republican principles have been followed and policies administered prosperity, happiness and healthful development have testified to their wisdom and beneficence. Our people are satisfied. The whole history of the republican party is replete with success. In this historical light the present policies and measures of the party will be crowned by success—success because wisely sought and rightly deserved. If this can be asserted of the opposition history must be rewritten.

EXPENSIVE BACON.

Last session of congress Bacon of Georgia asked the Secretary of War to furnish a list of articles

purchased by the military department of Cuba. The secretary declined to do so because of the vast labor and heavy expense such an undertaking would involve. Bacon persisted, and, appealing to the senate when it was in an amiable mood had that body pass a resolution calling for an itemized list of such purchases. This list now appears in six large volumes the compilation of which cost the government the sum of \$40,000. It shows the cost of every broom, bottle of ink, stick of sealing wax and bushel of oats purchased. Its value to the country is about 40 cents. No senator or congressman has time, inclination or necessity to examine the details embraced in this publication. It is of no practical value to any one. It shows this, however, that mere partisanship is an expensive thing, because it is blind, biased and reckless. Mr. Bacon's evident purpose was to obtain something he might use to embarrass the administration in its conduct of Cuban affairs, and of course in his view the end justified the means whatever the labor and expense. In both national and state politics it is just such little partisans as he who ring all the changes on "economy" and make the wildest charges of "inefficiency and extravagance."

This incident furnishes an apt illustration of what silly things are permitted by an indulgent majority when "senatorial courtesy" is skillfully invoked. It also emphasizes the necessity of infusing the senate with fresh blood by selecting senators who have some practical knowledge of business methods. When we choose senators by direct vote of the people we shall be able to meet this necessity; otherwise.
