KEEP IT IN SIGHT.

Not to be lost sight of by Oregon republicans is the influence our state election will have not only on congressional elections to follow in other states, but also on the next presidential campaign. There is little doubt that the question of retaining or ultimately abandoning control of the Philippines will then be the chief contention between the parties. The state democratic platform, the attitude of leading democrats in congress, the late utterances of Henry Watterson and the tone of the democratic press foreshadow that this is to be the issue.

It is true Oregon democrats have not the courage to declare for the policy of "scuttle and abandon" in clean cut, concise language, yet it is so plain this is their purpose, that it must be discussed before the people in our state campaign and receive their approval or disapproval at the polls next June. A democratic victory then would be heralded to the world as evidence that the people of Oregon are in favor of the democratic purpose of abandoning the Philippines to whatever fate may overtake them. Of course, in the almost certain event of republican victory the democrats would claim their platform presented no such issue. It is worded, they hope, to be equally useful in either event.

We have no thought that the American people can be induced to embrace a policy so unpatriotic and cowardly even though endorsed by the people of this state, and it is equally unthinkable that Oregonians are less patriotic and courageous than the mass of American people. Republicans of Oregon are not to be deceived as to democratic purpose. It is abandonment of the Philippines. Without doubt there are scores of patriotic democrats in the state who will not follow their party leaders one step in a course which can only end in national humiliation and shame to ourselves and irretrievable disaster to the Filipinos.

Since the opposition are doing their utmost to confuse and mislead the people on this subject it may clarify the situation if we remember that under international law we have a clear, indisputable right of sovereignty over and title to the Philippines. The war we waged was against Spain, not against the Filipinos. For whatever of conflict we have had with them they alone are responsible. Before the treaty of Paris was ratified they made war on our army and our flag. We had a right—it was our duty as well, to suppress their insurrection. But other duties are laid upon us. It is plain there is imposed upon this nation, as a sacred trust, the duty of leading these people to a higher and better social and political life—to a civilization of which at present they have no intelligent conception. No more sacred trust was laid upon the Israelites of old. We dare not falter. Having accepted the trust and entered upon our duty, and having already made substantial and gratifying progress shall we now or at any time cower and draw back and ignominiously abandon our God-imposed duty?

This is just what the democratic party contemplates doing. After all our expenditure of blood and treasure; notwithstanding the

plainest evidences of our beneficent influence upon and rule over these people, that party would renounce our sovereignty, haul down the American flag, declare these islands foreign territory and abandon them to the cupid and rapacity of whatever nation might seize them. The American people are Anglo-Saxon, a race that never shirks duty, never abandons its efforts for the elevation of mankind. The record of our splendid Second Oregon appeals to us. By the memory of its achievements and its heroic dead, Oregonians cannot accept the cowardly policy of Philippine abandonment. We are confident this will be the verdict recorded at the polls in June.

It is urged in favor of Mr. Farley's idea for the betterment of roads that "the citizens of Corvallis and Philomath, who escape the two mill levy under the new road law, will have to bear their portion of the money appropriated for roads by the county court, and the whole burden of road improvement will not fall on people who reside in the country." The bonding plan, set forth in the GAZETTE has the same virtue. As Mr. Morgan says, "the only just and equitable way, (to raise funds for this road improvement) is by taxation, which will reach and fall on all alike, both resident and non-resident according to wealth and ability to pay." The people of Corvallis have never failed to do their part in assisting in the betterment of the county roads, and we have yet to hear of one of them who does not favor the bonding plan.

A local contemporary states that the platform recently issued by Oregon democracy favors giving the Philippine islands to the Filipinos, "retaining in the end such ports and stations as may provide for our widest trade in the Orient." The republican platform is also in favor of retaining such advantages in the far East as will provide for our widest trade in the Orient, but some Filipinos have withheld consent. Suppose they should object to the democratic policy of retaining such ports and stations as the democrats should select; would the democratic party favor relinquishment of those ports and stations, or would it wring from the Filipinos by force of arms these necessary provisions for our widest trade in the Orient?

Republicans, you are asked what has the governor of Oregon to do with the Philippines? You might give a Yankee answer and reply: "What do the republicans of Oregon want with a governor who represents everything politically to which republicans are opposed?"

J. K. Weatherford will do as well as any man the democrats could put up for congress. But a man of Tongue's energy and ability who is in the office cannot be put out by a few weeks' campaigning.—Salem Journal.

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HOMER'S ILLIAD.

Book II—A Literal Translation by C. Maclean, Ph. D. Lines 484-785—The Forces of the Achaeans.

INTRODUCTORY NOTE: "The catalogue of the ships which now follows, and which from its first word has received the name Boetia, has always been celebrated as an ancient piece of geography, and for the accuracy and clearness of its topographical details. An ordered arrangement of the countries mentioned is preserved through the whole enumeration. Commencing at Boetia, the poet conducts his reader through the states lying on the direct route to Peloponnesus, after which he proceeds from place to place to Thessaly, in the order, as Trollope observes, in which a traveler would visit them. The distinctive features of each country are noticed, and the fidelity of which description the results of modern travel bear ample testimony. There is also a pleasing variety and beauty of detail, which, with its rare melody of versification, has always rendered this a charming portion of the Iliad. As a specimen of ancient geography, such respect was paid to it that it was not only commented upon by many writers, but in some of the Grecian states the youth were required by law to commit it to memory. Solon is said to have appealed to it in the dispute between Athens and Megara, respecting the possession of Salamis." OWEN.
