THE METHOD, NOT THE MAN.

A letter from Mr. Farley, published in the last issue of the Times, discloses the fact that Mr. Farley attaches undue importance to the attention given himself in the GAZETTE'S articles on the question of county road improvement. The GAZETTE has neither time, space nor inclination to discuss Mr. Farley; but it has the right to discuss all matters touching the public's interests, and it proposes to exercise it. It was the plan, known as the "Farley plan," that the GAZETTE considered in its article of the 18th inst, and not the name of the plan itself. If Mr. Farley can show wherein the plan he advocates is better than the one suggested by the GAZETTE, he will be expending his energies to some purpose. His idea is a fairly good one, but it is not above criticism. In offering what it still believes to be a better one the GAZETTE said: "We have attempted here only to outline in a crude way a plan of procedure, which, we believe, will give us good roads quickly, at a moderate cost, and in such a way that the burden will not all come at once, but be distributed over a number of years. We offer it for the consideration of the people of the county, and solicit opinions from all interested upon its merits."

Mr. Farley is now given a special invitation to express his opinion of the merits of that plan as then set forth. He must understand that the GAZETTE has no quarrel with him. If it were discussing Mr. Farley it would have nothing adverse to say. In setting him right, however, it must correct some of the statements made in his article in the Times.

The GAZETTE did not say "that discussion of the roads was not for the best." What it said was this: "Agitation of the matter of bad roads is going to prove hurtful to the community, unless some adequate remedy can be supplied. Let us quit harping about the 'fearful condition of our roads'—we all know they are bad enough, and devote our attention to 'Good roads; how to get them.'" All of which had no reference to Mr. Farley or his plan.

In the same article we said: "Our road supervisors have shown commendable interest in offering plans and methods of procedure, but there are good and sufficient objections to every thing suggested thus far." Mr. Farley's contention that his district is as much entitled to aid as a district near Corvallis; that Corvallis districts should not be given greater aid in proportion than districts in other localities, and that nothing can be done with a two-mill road tax, is not in dispute, but is just what the GAZETTE has maintained. The plan suggested by it will give proportionate assistance to every district in the county, will provide sufficient funds for improvement of 200 miles of road in this county, and give us better roads in a shorter time, at far less expense, than any other plan so far devised.

The platform constructed by the late democratic convention at Portland, calls the ship subsidy bill "a piece of audacious robbery," and makes a demand for its defeat. Here is another sample of democratic consistency. The first ship subsidy act ever

passed in the United States was a democratic measure. It became a law fifty years ago, and under it some of the finest ships of their day in the world, built in American ship yards, were paid several millions of dollars from the national treasury under antebellum democratic administration.

The article in the last issue of the Times, signed "Republican," and purporting that it was written to that paper from Portland, is appearing as an original editorial in other democratic papers. Can it be that "Republican" is really the editor of the Times.

In November, 1900, old Benton county endorsed the policies advocated by William McKinley by a majority of 188 votes. These same policies, advocated by William Furnish, will be as strongly endorsed on the 2nd of June.

Remove the Beam.

Local democracy is so dazzled by the gleam of hope for the success of the ticket it sees in republican disaffection in Multnomah county, that it is blind to the large number of voters in its own party here at home, who refuse "tamely to gulp down the nominations put forward" by certain leaders and bosses.

The following is submitted for their perusal. It appeared in the Oregonian of recent issue, and was dated at Corvallis:

"The democratic primaries in Benton County have been held, and the result might have been more satisfactory to the old war-horses of the party. It was plain to be seen that there was an unusual desire and feeling manifested on the part of certain leaders and bosses to conciliate certain elements of the party which had strayed from the fold during the last two presidential elections. In their anxiety to bring about an affiliation [another name for fusion] of those who had wandered off after strange gods, they were rewarded for their return to their 'first love' and for their apostasy, with the honor of full fledged democratic delegates to the county convention. Hence, as a natural result, the old war-horses of Jacksonian Democracy were consigned to a back seat, and shall, in consequence, have to submit and lamely gulp down [in a horn] the nominations put forward by the assistance of these self-made renegades.

It is, however, questionable in my mind whether this audacious presumption on the part of those so-called leaders will be silently and dumbly tolerated by the 'unaffiliated.' I shall not be surprised if these questions will arise in the minds of all honest, intelligent, independent voters: Shall this state of affairs be permitted to continue with impunity? Shall any untrammelled, high-minded democrat receive this slap in the face without resentment or murmur? If so, I am forced to question their democracy. Verily, it is apparent to the most superficial observer that the politician's faith in the gullibility of the masses is simply unlimited.

HOMER'S ILLIAD.

Book II—A Literal Translation by C. Maclean, Ph. D.

Vv. 546-785—The forces of the Achaeans (continued).

The Athenians: Who inhabited Athens—a well built city, the country of the magnanimous Erechtheus—whom formerly Athene, the daughter of Zeus, brought up, but (whom) the fruitful Earth brought forth, and she (Athene) settled (him) in Athens—in her own rich people. And here the youths of Athens appeared him as the years rolled by with bulls and lambs (i. e. with offerings of bulls and lambs)—these, Menestheus, son of Peleus, commanded. There never was a man like him to marshal steeds and spear-bearing warriors: Nestor alone vied (with him); for he was the elder. Him fifty sable ships accompanied.

The Salaminians: Ajax led from Salamis twelve ships. And leading (them) he set (them) in array where the phalaxes of the Athenians were drawn up. The Argives: Who inhabited Argos and Tirgus, rich in walls, Hermonis and Asine, which occupy a deep bay (i. e. the Argolic gulf), and Troezen and Eionae and the vine-clad Epidaurus, and who inhabited Aegina and Mases—youthful men of the Achaeans. These, Diomedes, valiant in war, and Stenelus, dear son of illustrious Kapaneus, commanded. And along with them went Euryalus as third (commander)—a man like a god, son of Mekisteus the son of King Talauus. And Diomedes, valiant in war, led all together (i. e. was commander-in-chief).
