SUGAR OF CHAMBERLAIN.

Deny it as they may, dodge it as persistently as they are able, democratic campaign orators and anti organs can not alter the fact that the issue in the present state campaign is the retention or abandonment of the Philippine islands, and not the personality of candidates. The only effect their policy of denial and evasion can possibly have will be to convict them of being ashamed of their platform and its principles.

It is fortunate that both parties have placed before the people candidates of good character and more than ordinary ability, for this eliminates the question of personality and forestalls the bitterness that too often intrudes itself into a campaign where men and not measures are being considered. So far as their personality is concerned, Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Furnish stand on common ground. In fitness for discharging the duties of the office to which each aspires, Mr. Furnish is easily Mr. Chamberlain's superior. While this should go far in determining the votes of those who are wavering between a choice of the two candidates, the vital question is this: "Will the voters of Oregon, by their ballots next June, endorse the policy of the republican administration in the Philippines, or will they declare against it?"

Should Mr. Chamberlain be elected the democratic press of the entire country would declare that the state of Oregon had endorsed the scuttling plank in the democratic platform. No one outside of this state will know or care what is the name of the man elected. The country at large will be interested in knowing only whether Oregon has gone republican or democratic.

And the democracy of Oregon realize this. They are endeavoring to coat the scuttling plank with sugar of Chamberlain. No better evidence of this fact is necessary than that furnished by the recent democratic convention. The greater part of its time and attention was taken up with consideration of the Philippine plank. For the better part of two days the platform committee argued and quarreled over the language of this plank, and every spell-binding delegate who was permitted to enter the committee room fumed and vapored over its provisions. And all for what? If the Philippine question is not an issue in this campaign, why did the late democratic convention expend so much time and talent in defining its position on this question? For ways that are dark and tricks that are vain the present democratic campaign is peculiar.

The St. Louis Globe-Democrat says: "The republican party expects to hear grand news from Oregon on the night of June 2nd. The Oregon republicans expect to roll up a good sized majority for their ticket. More than once that June election in Oregon has given encouragement to the republican party of the country in important national canvasses. There is good reason to suppose that the same state will rise to the importance of the occasion in the present instance, and by the magnitude of its republican vote, inspire enthusiasm in the party in the rest of the country. The eyes of the United States will be on that historic commonwealth for the next few weeks."

All parties admit that Benton county is safely republican. Let us see by how large a majority, June 2nd.

T. J. Risley.

The sketch which outlines the career of T. J. Risley, republican candidate for assessor of Benton county, tells the story of a poor boy's battle with the world. Born in the state of Illinois, December 24, 1865, Mr. Risley came to Benton county with his parents when he was ten years of age. Until he was 21, he worked on his father's farm, grubbing, chopping wood and doing the various kinds of work familiar to all lads who have grown to manhood on the farm.

He attended school a few months each winter, and finally entered the Agricultural College. He attended this institution one year in the old building here in Corvallis, and one year in the new structure on College Hill. An item of interest and one which shows the esteem in which Mr. Risley was held by his fellows, is the fact that he was chosen president of the first literary society ever organized in the new college, defeating John Applewhite, a senior. Having to depend upon his own earnings to carry him through college, Mr. Risley put in Saturdays and spare time working on the college farm. He also earned a few dollars acting as pressman for the Benton County Leader, then edited by M. L. Pipes.

In the spring of 1888, Mr. Risley took examination under Supt. J. J. Bryan, for a teacher's certificate. Being successful, he secured a school and began teaching. Since that time he has taught fourteen terms in the various school districts of this county. He attended the state normal school at Monmouth, to better fit himself for this work.

Ten years ago Mr. Risley bought a small tract of land. As his means allowed he added more land, until now he owns 56 acres nine miles north of this city. He has taken an active part in the work of the Grange, and was chosen a delegate from Fairmount Grange to the County Grange convention held in Corvallis last March. He was elected secretary of that body, and was chosen as one of the representatives to the State Grange.

As assessor of this county he will make fair and equitable assessments, and he has the ability and determination to administer the duties of that office honestly and well.
