CONSENT OF THE GOVERNED.

The democratic press, democratic leaders in congress and campaign workers are making much ado over government without consent of the governed in the Philippines. They portray the course of the republican party and administration in these islands as despotic, tyrannical and utterly subversive of the spirit of the Declaration of Independence. All this is the boldest demagoguery. Throughout our whole history we have governed men without their consent. We have always done so in our territories, are doing so today. What man in any territory votes for government thereof, or judges? They have a delegate in congress, but he has no right to vote on any public measure. His advice may be sought and followed on matters pertaining to the territory, but more frequently he is wholly ignored. Through all the years we have governed the Indians without their consent. But few of them have ever been or can be fitted for even a limited degree of self government. The citizens of the District of Columbia are governed by laws enacted by congress and administered by commissions appointed by the president and confirmed by the senate. We withhold self government from the people of our territories mainly for two reasons: Because they are unfitted for it, or because they are not numerous enough to conduct an organized government. When qualified for it we have never refused them the full measure of self government guaranteed by our constitution and contemplated by the signers of the Declaration of Independence. This is just what we are doing and shall do with the Philippines. Can the democratic party do more? Dare it advocate less? Were the Philippines prepared for statehood the republican party would bring them into the American Union; the democratic party would surrender our sovereignty over them and leave them to their own devices. But Mr. Chamberlain would not haul down our flag there. Oh, no; not he. But he would plant it on the constitution. He knows, every intelligent citizen knows that the only part of the constitution which the flag carries to any of our territorial possessions is that which declares "That congress shall have power to dispose of and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States." The Philippines are governed according to the constitution.

The hue and cry for "consent of the governed" comes with ill grace from that party which defiantly boasts in the U. S. Senate that large numbers of men in one section of the union are forcibly and fraudulently deprived of all participation in the rights and privileges of self government. These men who, through the agency of the lash, the bludgeon, the torch and the shotgun are deprived of participating in their own government, are by far better qualified for self government than the Filipinos are. Tillman's speech must convince honest democrats that when their leaders are bewailing the violation of the constitution

and the principles of the "important declaration" they are simply playing the demagogue.

Book II—A Literal Translation by C. MacLean, Ph. D. Vv. 681-759—Tribes, commanders and ships [continued]. Division III—Thessalian Greece from Mts. Oeta and Othrys to Olympus: The Myrmidons. But now [O Muse tell me] those, who [lit. as many as] inhabited that Pelasgian city—Argos; and who dwell in Alus and who in Alope and who in Trechis, and who inhabited Phthia and Hellas rich in beautiful women, but who are called Myrmidons and Hellenes and Achians. Now, of fifty ships of these, Achilles was the commander. But they were not mindful of the harsh sounding war, for there was no one who might lead them into ranks [i. e. so as to form ranks]. For the noble, the swift-footed Achilles, lay inactive in camp, enraged on account of the fair-haired maiden, the daughter of Breezeis, whom he carried off from Lyrnessus after having endured many hardships, after having destroyed Lyrnessus and the walls of Thebes, and cast down [i. e. killed] Mnestes and Epeistrophus—experts with the spear—sons of King Eneus, son of Sylepiades; for he lay inactive, grieving [at his heart], but he was soon to rise to action. The Phylakians: And who inhabited Phylake and the flowery Pyrrhus and the sacred field of Cyres, and Iton, the mother of flocks, and Antron by the sea, and grassy Pteleon. Now, these the warlike Protesilaus commanded while he was alive; but already black earth keeps him down. And both his wife was left at Phylake with her two cheeks torn with grief and his house half finished; for him a Trojan warrior slew when leaping from his ship, the very first of the Achaeans. They, indeed, were not without a leader, yet they sorely missed their (former) commander; for Podarkes, a son of Ares, a son of Iphiklos, son of Phylaxos, rich in flocks of sheep, marshalled them. (He was) own brother of magnanimous Protesilaus, (but) younger by birth; but the brave warrior, Protesilaus, [was] both older and braver. His people did not at all want for a commander, but they truly missed him who was good [i. e. brave]. With him [i. e. Podarkes] forty sables ships went. The Phereans: And those who dwell in Phera near by the Boebean lake, Borebe and Glaphyra and well-built Iolkos. Of these the dear son of Admetos commanded eleven ships. Eumelas, whom Alkestis [Note: Her devotion to her husband was such that she died for him], divine among women, the most beautiful in form of the daughters of Pelias, brought forth to Admetos [lit. conceived by Admetos].
