

Isn't it about time that the state, outside of Multnomah county, be allowed to name an United States senator?

The great railroads of the country are doing everything in their power to encourage and assist in the movement for good roads. Can't some one find a sinister motive in this attitude of the railroads?

Because voters of Oregon showed by their ballots that they preferred Mr. Geer to Mr. Wood for United States senator, is no evidence that they prefer Mr. Geer to any republican for the same position.

Every present indication points to the fact that Mr. Geer stands no chance to be elected senator at this session of the legislature. His supporters, therefore, knowing this, simply show by their votes for Geer that they wish to defeat Mr. Fulton. Do these gentlemen, who are opposing Fulton, wish to see Harvey Scott elected United States senator? Or does Jonathan Bourne look good to them? If Charley Fulton is not the next United States senator from Oregon, the commercial interests of Portland will name the man who will be.

The suspension of the duty of 67 cents per ton on anthracite coal, is being celebrated by democracy as a triumph for Senator Vest in particular and itself in general. In passing the bill, suspending the duty on coal containing not less than 95 per cent. of carbon, the republican congress complied with the following suggestion in President Roosevelt's message to congress December 2, 1902: "In my judgment, the duty on anthracite coal should be removed, and anthracite put actually where it is now nominally, on the free list. This would have no effect at all except in crisis; but in crisis it might be of service to the people." Democracy, where is thy victory?

O. A. C. Girls Won.

The Salem Statesman gives the following account of the brilliant work of the girls' team of O A C which defeated the W U girls at Salem last Friday in the second game of the series between these teams. O A C won the first game as well:

In one of the hardest fought basket ball games ever played in the Willamette University gymnasium, last night the plucky Willamette girls went down to an honorable defeat before the Corvallis belles.

The score was 5 to 1, but even this score, although close, does not give a correct idea of the game between the two teams which were so evenly matched, both being trained to a high state of perfection.

The first half, which was fifteen minutes in length, was fiercely contested from start to finish, and resulted in the score of 2 to 0, in favor of the O A C, Miss Ethel Linville having succeeded in tossing one basket. The second half of twenty minutes, was played even harder than the first. Ethel Linville and Una Stewart for Corvallis and Nellie Parsons and Minnie Koschmeider for Willamette, each playing like demons. During this half Miss Lottie Randall received a sprained ankle, and time was called while she was removed and her place filled by Gussie Randall. Una Stewart threw one basket for Corvallis, and each team scored one point on foul, making the final score 5 to 1 in favor of Corvallis.

The individual work of each player was strenuous, but Corvallis showed superior team work, and it was this slight superiority which won the game for Corvallis. The playing was entirely clean on both sides, nothing occurring to mar the sportsmanlike qualities of the game.

Boom Law Unconstitutional.

The supreme court of this state has handed down its decision in the case of the Chas. K. Spaulding Logging Company, a corporation, respondent, vs. the Independence & Falls City Lumber & Improvement Company, a corporation, appellants, affirming the decree of the court below. The supreme court holds that the present Oregon boom law is unconstitutional and void.

This appeal was made from a decree enjoining the use of the Luckiamute river, a stream flowing through the counties of Benton and Polk, by defendant, under an alleged franchise acquired in pursuance of the provisions of an act passed by the legislative assembly of 1901.

Program For Parents' Meeting.

The program of the "Parents' Meeting," to be held next Saturday, in the public school building of this city, has been arranged and mailed by Supt. Denman. The subjects to be discussed are such as appeal to parent and teacher. These parents' meetings take the place of the local institutes heretofore held. But the parents' meetings connect them directly with this work, while the teachers' interest should be increased, for they have an opportunity to meet with the parents and discuss many problems now existing in our school work.
