

COLLEGE DECISION AGAIN.

Union county is active again in her efforts to divide the Oregon Agricultural College.

During the legislative session of 1901, a most determined effort was made by the delegation from Union county to secure a division of this great institution.

"This department holds that the expenditure of funds appropriated in accordance with the act of congress of March 2, 1887, for the maintenance of permanent sub-stations is contrary to the spirit and intent of said act."

When the legislature of a state or territory has given its assent to the act of congress of March 2, 1887, and has designated the institution which shall receive the benefit of said act, it would seem to have exhausted its powers in the matter.

GOVERNMENT BY INJUNCTION.

Much has been said, especially in labor organizations, against "government by injunction."

If these allegations were true it would be equally that our courts are venal and corrupt, and that the laws are administered in favor of a few to the hurt of the many.

In truth there is no just cause for complaint because our courts frequently exercise their power to enjoin. It is rarely that our judges are in error in issuing an injunction.

Upon such showing a preliminary injunction will be issued. All parties may then come into court and present testimony and make argument.

This, in brief, is the legal procedure. Whom does it injure? Who, desiring to obey the laws, will object? Where is the instance of a court restraining the doing of a lawful act in a lawful manner?

The trouble with the labor organizations is clearly that they have been restrained from trespassing, from picketing, from boycotting and kindred illegal acts.

manner they might complain; but no court in the land would enjoin them from doing so though petitioned by all the employers within the court's jurisdiction.

It is not at all probable that courts will be prohibited from declaring them unlawful practices and, upon occasion, restraining men from engaging in them.

When the committee appointed by the Miner's convention, held at Judianapolis, begin to labor with U. S. senators in support of anti-injunction legislation, it is likely to get an inkling, at least, that it does not know all about "government by injunction."

FIXING THE BLAME.

There has been much discussion as to where the responsibility for the shortage of coal and the consequent suffering should be placed. Great efforts have been made to place this on the coal operators.

This is strong language, but the testimony of many witnesses before the strike commission warrants its use and stamps it as the truth.

To the end, however, that this present bill may not be given encouragement, friends of the Agricultural College may well watch its course in the legislature.

Of course, the United Mine Workers knew, what every one familiar with the coal trade knows, that the product of the mines during the winter months falls far short of the demand for consumption, and that the shortage must be made up from the accumulated surplus of the summer's output.

The miners make no effort to increase the output. The Sun says: "Not once since the strike was ended have the miners done what could be called a full day's work."

That sort of unionism which leads it votaries into lawlessness and crime and renders them indifferent to public welfare is surely not the kind that the American people will tolerate.

Labor leaders cannot too quickly nor too earnestly impress this upon their followers.
