THE BIBLE IN SCHOOLS.

There is a well defined and active sentiment, east and west, in favor of restoring the use of the English bible in the public schools. The promise of such a step is found in the fact that it is advocated alike by Protestants, Catholics and non-sectarians. All of these recognize the value of the bible as literature—as a textbook in history, poetry, rhetoric, ethics, and in the English language.

The most intelligent Catholics freely admit the superiority of the authorized English version of the bible over all others in its fidelity to the English language. As an example of pure English diction and correct idiomatic phraseology it stands unmatched in the entire field of English literature.

Regarded merely as the most efficient aid in attaining a correct knowledge and facile use of English it should be restored to use in the public schools.

But the bible also sets forth the most perfect and comprehensive code of ethics presented to men. No parent, no patriot anywhere objects to his children being instructed in ethics found in the bible. Its record of political and social history is accepted by men as being unusually accurate. Its poetry is grand, inspiring, patriotic.

But thoughtful men see more than all this. They see that the bible is not a sectarian book—that its teachings, whether in the field of history, poetry, language and ethics are right, lofty, pure and elevating, and their consequent influence upon the plastic mind of youth very much to be desired.

They also see that these teachings and this influence can be made available without resorting to creedal dogma, or justly offending any sect. Whatever of creedal and sectarian tenets may be evolved from or supported by bible authority does not need to work the exclusion of the bible from the list of text-books for use in the public schools, because the book is not sectarian, as our people understand that term, and teachers may easily be restrained from using it in a sectarian interest.

It is quite incomprehensible why the use of the bible in the schools should ever have been forbidden. We have questioned scores of men and women who in childhood and youth attended public schools in which it was daily used as a text-book, and we have found none who ever knew it to be used in the interest of any sect.

It is to be hoped that right views on this subject will become insistent until this most wonderful book is again an acceptable textbook in all our public schools.

TOO TARDY.

It would be amusing, were it not quite nauseating, the ardent homage paid by prominent and would-be prominent democrats to the memory of President Lincoln. The character of the man, his patriotism, his integrity, his principles and purposes are the themes of unstinted democratic praise; unqualified democratic approval and eternal democratic attachment.

Yet among all our presidents there is no one who was so cruelly and maliciously abused, maligned and hated by democrats as Abraham Lincoln. The democratic party ardently opposed every principle Lincoln held dear—opposed his most unselfish and patriotic acts, opposed every measure and policy of his public life.

Our democratic friends, W. J. Bryan, Tom Johnston, D. B. Hill and others, protest too much and altogether too tardily. It looks as if they think the memory of Lincoln a spell to conjure with, and it is, but democrats invoke the spell. They betray themselves as certainly as the donkey that assayed to pass as a lion.

Did democrats come to worship at the shrine of Lincoln with bowed heads and bated breath, and acknowledge the grievous wrongs they did to him and his most cherished principles, we might regard them with some patience in spite of our repugnance for the tricks of demagoguery.

A few days more and we shall know the real choice of the Union delegation. He is a timid snail, whoever he may be.

WASHINGTON, June 23, 1834—MY DEAR SON: Fletcher wrote me from Exeter, the next day after your arrival, and informed me that you had been so fortunate as to be received at Colonel Chadwick's, and was commencing your studies. I am glad you are so well situated, and trust you will make progress in your studies. You are at a most important period of your life, my dear son, soon growing up to be a young man, and a boy no longer, and I feel great anxiety for your success and happiness. I beseech you to be attentive to all your duties, and to fulfill every obligation with cheerfulness and punctuality. Above all, remember your moral and religious concerns. Be constant at church and prayer, and every other appointment for worship. There can be no solid character and no true happiness which are not founded on a sense of religious duty. Avoid all evil company and every temptation, and consider that you have now left your father's house and gone forth to improve your own character and prepare your own mind for the part you are to lead in life. All that can be done for you by others will amount to nothing unless you do much for yourself. Cherish all the good counsel which your dear mother used to give you, and let those of us who are yet alive have the pleasure of seeing you come forward as one who gives promise of virtue, usefulness and distinction. I fervently commend you to the blessing of our Heavenly Father.
