CONGRESSMAN.

The friends of every other man who wishes to be nominated for congress will oppose the nomination of Mr. Herman. All of those who desire a man elected in the first district who will put all of his push and energy to Portland Columbia river and neglect the improvements in the first district will oppose Mr. Herman. The farmers and producers of the Willamette valley and of Benton county who received during Mr. Herman's term nearly the same price for wheat and other produce as was paid in Portland will favor Mr. Herman because of his able effort assisted by Messrs. Dolph and Mitchell appropriations were had whereby Yaquina bay was improved making possible the reduction of freights so that farmers were able to sell for increased prices. Had Messrs. Dolph, Mitchell and Herman been promptly returned as they should have been, there is no doubt but that the appropriation which they had obtained during the last part of their terms would have been sustained, and Yaquina bay would probably have continued with increase of traffic until today. But the opposing elements made it possible that neither one of those gentlemen should be promptly returned. Hence the only way of regulating and reducing freights was cut off to the people. As before the improvement of Yaquina bay freights on the river and both railroads running north and south now are practically the same making it prohibitive to develop some other wise, good industries on account of high freight rates. With Mr. Herman again elected to congress and Messrs. Mitchell and Fulton now in the senate Oregon will again approach as near as possible at this time the strong and able workers exemplified when Dolph, Mitchell and Herman were there. It remains to be demonstrated whether the producers of this country who in the end have to pay the difference in exorbitant rates in transportation will take such interest in these matters as to work for their respective interests.

The people interested in these regulations guided by his past public service know that Mr. Herman will do all in his power for these interests, and also he will do justice to all parts of the state.

ADJUTANT-GENERAL'S REPORT.

The eighth bi-ennial report of the adjutant-general of the state is very comprehensive, concise and instructive.

With an authorized strength of 2,164 commissioned officers and enlisted men, the muster rolls of the several organizations show an organized strength of 1,320 officers and enlisted men, organized into one brigade.

The reports of Colonel James Jackson, inspector-general, and Lieutenant-Colonel C. A. Williams, U. S. A., show this force to be well organized, equipped, disciplined and instructed, and one of which the state may justly feel proud.

The ordinary citizen is unable to form an adequate conception of the long continued and arduous labor which has been necessary, especially on the part of the field and general officers, to create and develop a body of citizen soldiery until it attains the high degree of perfection reached by our little brigade of national guards. Beginning with a crude organization working under an antiquated and impractical law, and a weak public sentiment to support their efforts, these men have persistently and intelligently worked on through evil report and good report until the inspector-general is able to truthfully assert that our military code and regulations are as well adapted to the needs of the guard as in any state in the union.

Of the men who labored for years to reach these results no one has been more efficient and intelligently enthusiastic than General Chas. F. Beebe. His first connection with national guard service was with the celebrated N. Y. Seventh. He entered the service in this state as captain of Co. "K" of the 1st regiment. He soon became colonel of that regiment, which he brought to a high degree of excellency in discipline, drill, and organization. He was then appointed to the command of the brigade, and raised that organi-

zation to the high character it reached.

Col. Jackson is a retired officer of the U. S. army with a military education and years of active service to his credit. His connection with the national guard has been of the greatest benefit, and has done much to bring it up to the standard of efficiency it has reached.

The commanding officers of the organizations forming the brigade have borne their part efficiently and well. It is with a feeling of regret that the reorganization of the guard now made necessary deprives the state of a number of her most efficient and meritorious officers.

We are not informed where the one regiment of the reorganized force will have headquarters, nor who will be its commander. It seems possible that the present 3rd Regt. commanded by Colonel E. Everett, with headquarters at Portland, may be retained and raised to its maximum number of companies—twelve—by companies stationed in different localities in the state.

We think this probable, because Multnomah county has in Portland a well appointed armory, capable of housing eight companies, a large drill hall, ample in size for battalion drill, and also a good indoor rifle range. With these facilities, the major part of the regiment should be in Portland. Colonel Everett is an experienced, skillful, enthusiastic and efficient officer, who has brought his command up to a high degree of excellency in every particular, and it is certain no mistake would be made in retaining the 3rd Regt. as a nucleus of reorganization.

The lower branch of the Montana legislature has passed a bill providing that newspapers shall publish a statement once a month, on the first page, setting forth the true ownership of the paper, and requiring further that all editorialists must be signed with the name of the writer. Such legislation has been tried in other states, but is always productive of little result. It may be well enough to acquaint the public with the ownership of a paper, but the identity of the writer of its editorials is not public property. Editorial utterances derive their importance from the fact that they are an expression of the views and policy of the paper in which they appear. They are frequently radically at variance with the man who is employed to write them. If any reader is dissatisfied with the statement as published, his recourse is not against the man who wrote them, but against the paper.—Portland Journal.
