UNDER TWO FLAGS.

The difficulty of constructing a platform which will be acceptable to both Mr. Cleveland and his followers and to Mr. Bryan and his supporters becomes more and more apparent.

R. L. Metcalf, editor of the *Omaha World-Herald* has published a letter in his paper which he addresses to N. E. Mack of the *Buffalo Times*, and which may be regarded as a declaration of Bryan and his followers to stand by the Kansas City platform as firmly as they did in 1900.

Metcalf propounds a series of pungent interrogatives embracing each plank of the Kansas City platform and asks Mr. Mack to formulate a platform which shall "avoid incurring the hostility of Mr. Cleveland and his followers." He asks: "How many of the principles and policies in which we believe must we surrender in order to avoid incurring this hostility?"

The hostility of Bryan and his followers toward Cleveland and the gold standard democrats was never more bitter than at present. Bryan cannot forget nor forgive the fact that Cleveland and his friends not only refused to support him in 1896 and 1900, but did support the republican nominee for president. It is asking quite too much to require those who staid by the party to sacrifice the principles they hold so dear in order to win back to the fold men who openly deserted the party and aided to defeat it. We repeat, this is asking too much. Mr. Bryan's followers are many times more numerous than Mr. Cleveland's. They should, and doubtless will write the democratic platform for 1904.

Just here we would remark that Bryan's friends in this congressional district are asked to support a candidate who is supposed to be as loyal to Cleveland now as he was in 1896 and 1900.

Republicans understand why he writhes and twists around when brought up to the last national platform of his party. Yet he must accept it. He must also be willing to accept whatever may be the next platform. There is no doubt he will do so. It is altogether probable he would promise now to accept any sort of a platform that may be adopted, for he is now seeking votes.

Whether Mr. Reames is a Cleveland democrat, a Bryan democrat or as sound a protectionist as the late Congressman Tongue, democrats must decide for themselves.

Republicans understand he has no sort of claim which entitles him to their support. Much as they would be pleased to see harmony prevail in the democratic camp they can do nothing to bring it about.

General Thorp in Alsea.

On May 23rd an interesting political meeting was held at Alsea, Oregon. General T. J. Thorp, of Corvallis, made a most excellent address, discussing political issues before a large audience of ladies and gentlemen.

General Thorp clearly showed the democratic position on the trusts, saying that the democratic remedy for trusts is to remove the protective tariff, but thereby they would destroy the foundation of American industry.

The speaker proved that the trusts were not a product of a protective tariff, for inland railroads do not receive a tariff protection. He said that Mr. Pierpont Morgan, the great American trust organizer is a leading democrat; that the democrats had never passed any anti-trust legislation, even during the Cleveland administration. The speaker said, "I am a laborer but must confess that during those times I was unable to keep the patches off my pants."

What do you think of the Sherman anti-trust law, the recent record of the president and the republican party concerning the trusts? The speaker compared the present times with the Cleveland administration.

Should you desire a return to this unsettled condition of affairs vote for Mr. Reames, for to vote for him is a backward step in this direction. But if you are satisfied with present prices and general prosperity, vote for Mr. Hermann and sustain the present administration.

The meeting here was a success and Mr. Hermann will receive a good majority.

MR. HERMANN'S ADDRESS.

His Speech, Here, Saturday, Was a Most Able Effort, and Aroused Much Enthusiasm.

Though there were counter attractions in Corvallis last Saturday, Honorable Binger Hermann had a good sized audience hear him speak, the circuit court room of the court house being well filled with enthusiastic republicans, together with a few democrats and several ladies.

After paying his respects to the ladies for their presence, Mr. Hermann proceeded to discuss the issues between the two main parties in this campaign. He said as far as he was concerned this campaign must be conducted on gentlemanly principles, and he would not have one word to say derogatory of his opponent.

He showed that he believed in principles enunciated in the republican platforms of the country and that he is in hearty accord with the administration at Washington. He paid a glowing tribute to President Roosevelt, and from the cheers of those present it is known that he struck a responsive chord in the hearts of his hearers.

After discussing at some length the questions between the parties as to protection, trusts, Philippine Islands, etc., he closed by asking his auditors to not forget to come to the polls on June 1st.

Upon adjournment of the meeting the bar of the court house was filled with citizens shaking the hand of Mr. Hermann and giving him promise of their enthusiastic support in this election.

Berkeley Won First Honors

Prohibition in all its phases was ably presented to an audience that filled the large auditorium of the college armory last Friday evening. The speakers represented the best talent in the leading colleges and universities of the states of Oregon, Washington and California; and they were a credit to the institutions that sent them. Long before the speakers made their appearance the major portion of the audience had assembled. There was no time to become tired, however, for the cheers and yells of the various schools represented supplied plenty of entertainment.

An excellent musical program was rendered, the opening number being a piano solo by Miss Edith Gibson. The other selections followed in this order: Vocal solo, Otto Herse; vocal solo, Miss Cronise; song, college quartet.

W. Clifford Smith, University of California, was the first speaker. He took for his subject: "Young America's Responsibility," and presented the temperance question in such a new and winning light, so free from the hackneyed exhortation and dull sets of figures usually palmed off as an argument in favor of total abstinence, that he won the instant attention of his auditors and the decision of the judges.

C. H. Bowman, of Whitworth, Wash., followed with a discussion of "The Nation's Evil, Its Cause and Cure." Mr. Bowman was in better voice than his competitors, but he lacked in delivery and his paper followed old lines.

J. W. Lough, University of Washington, had a strong oration, on "A Justification of the Prohibition Party," and his manner was so droll that his effort met a hearty reception.

"My Nation's Destiny," was the subject chosen by Dan A. Poling, of Dallas college, Oregon. Mr. Poling has splendid presence, but his delivery smacks too strongly of the pulpit. There is too much exhortation in his style, and he marred an otherwise able effort by crowding his argument down the throats of those who came to hear. He was justly entitled to second place, which he received, but, these objectionable features aside, he might have won first honors.

Aubrey Kramien, of Newberg, Or., was the last speaker. His subject was "Unconditional Surrender." We have not seen the markings of the judges, but it is our opinion that Mr. Kramien got closer to his audience than any other orator of the evening, and was, therefore, entitled to a high place in delivery.
