

With this issue of the GAZETTE, Geo. L. Paul severs his connection with the paper after twelve years of nearly continuous service. He entered as 'devil,' has passed through the various chairs as compositor, foreman and job printer, and for the last four years he has acted as editor and business manager. Are Ex-Officio Wardens

Although the season for killing China pheasants does not open for some weeks, we are informed these birds are being slaughtered in the fields surrounding Corvallis. In the light of this information, it may not be amiss to quote the following provisions of the present game law:

From and after the passage of this act the sheriffs and deputy sheriffs of the counties and constables of the various precincts and districts of the state of Oregon shall be and hereby are created ex-officio fire, game and fish wardens.

Said sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables or wardens shall have power without warrant, to search any boat, conveyance, vehicle, fish box, fish basket, game bag or game coat or other receptacle for game or fish, when they have good reason to believe that any of the laws for the protection of forest and timber lands, game and food fish have been violated; and the said sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables or wardens shall at any time seize and take possession of any and all birds, animals or fish which have been caught, taken or killed at any time in any manner or for a purpose, or had in their possession or under control; have been shipped or about to be shipped, contrary to any of the laws of this state.

Any sheriff, deputy sheriff, constable or warden, as informer or prosecutor, upon the arrest or conviction under the provisions of this act, shall in addition to the fees to which he may be entitled under existing laws, be entitled to receive one-third of the money collected in such action.

A Recorded Waterway.

Acting under instructions from the city council the sewer committee of that body has a force of men engaged in opening the College ditch from Monroe street to the place where it empties into Dixon Creek. Six men in charge of O. J. Treese began this work last Wednesday, and they expect to complete it in about twelve days. This ditch was opened about 1891, but it has been used as a dumping ground by residents along its banks, and is now filled with tin cans, bricks and all manner of junk. The ditch is recorded at the court house as an open waterway and a penalty attaches to obstructing it in any manner. It drains quite a section of country, and is a stream of considerable proportions during the winter months. When completed it will be seven feet wide, and will average four feet in depth. The ditch heads at the lane along the south side of the College campus and empties into Dixon creek near the crossing of the S. P. and C. & E. railroad tracks, being about one mile in length.
