THE STATE FAIR.

Opening Day a Record Breaker at the Salem Fair.

The best state fair in Oregon's history opened on Monday, September 14, at Salem. The crowd was immense, and is estimated to be twice the size of last year's attendance. The formal exercises consisted of addresses by Governor Chamberlain, Samuel Connell, ex-Governor Geer, Dr. Withycombe, H. B. Thielsen and Judge Boise.

Gov. Chamberlain entered a vigorous protest against the present forest reserve policy of the Interior Department. Mr. Connell gave a striking picture of the benefit to be derived from the Lewis and Clarke fair in 1905. Mr. Thielsen devoted his remarks to agricultural interests and development of Marion county, and Governor Geer to the growth of the State Fair during its forty odd years of existence. Dr. James Withycombe, of Corvallis, addressed the audience upon the good accomplished by the Fair and in speaking of its value as an educator and as an aid to the advancement of agricultural industries, said, among other things, that he doubted whether any other country on the face of the globe of similar area can show as large a variety of high-class products as are seen here. He urged the people of Oregon to endeavor to surpass this fair next year, and be prepared in 1905 to show the people of the world the greatness of Oregon's possibilities.

The audience in the pavilion was enthusiastic and loud applause greeted the good points of every speaker. The success of the exhibition is assured.

Mention might also be made of the residence of Mrs. Ann Smith, which has been moved to the northwest corner of the block and placed on a fine stone foundation, and together with improvements made on other houses in the block, very much is added to the appearance of that part of our city.

Practical information, teaching valuable facts - facts that have a cash value - a value that American farmers appreciate - is the feature of the Oregon Agricultural College exhibit at the State Fair. In addition to the clover and alfalfa demonstrations, the College has in its booth a very impressive display of onions. It is not the odor of the onions that makes the display impressive, but the figures that are given a prominent place on a card beside the vegetables. How to increase the yield of crops per acre, have been one of the great problems which the Agricultural College people have assigned themselves for solution, and they have grappled with the problem successfully. They give the method by which onions may be made to produce 75 percent better, and it will be well for our onion growers to look for the next bulletin from the College on this subject.

YAQUINA HARBOR.

Report of the Meeting at Newport and Arguments Presented.

The Board of United States Engineers, consisting of Colonel Heuer of San Francisco, Major Langfitt of Portland, and Major Mills of Seattle, met at Newport, on Tuesday, September 15, in accordance with notice previously given to investigate the advisability of continuing the improvement of the entrance to Yaquina Bay and to hear and receive arguments submitted in writing regarding the necessity of further work, says the Oregonian. The Board was accompanied by many representative business men from Albany and Corvallis, interested in opening this harbor to deeper draft seagoing vessels than present depth of water will permit to enter with safety.

The public meeting took place at 11 o'clock. Colonel Heuer stated the object of the Board meeting and inviting those interested to present statements in support of the necessity of carrying on the improvement of Yaquina harbor.

Hon. J. K. Weatherford read and submitted a report from the Alco Club of Albany, which was a strong and most convincing argument of the inestimable value the improvement of this harbor would be to Linn county and Benton, Lane, Marion, Polk, Crook and Lincoln counties, which are contiguous to the line of the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad and directly tributary to Yaquina Bay, and upon the deepening of that harbor depended so much the development of their natural and unlimited resources.

Statements concerning resources of these counties had been presented to the former Board of Engineers from years ago which was not deemed necessary to again enumerate, as they are yet available in the hands of the department. Mr. Weatherford also called attention of the Board to the vast territory of South-eastern Oregon as yet wholly without transportation facilities, and assured them that with the opening of Yaquina harbor the C. & E. R. R. would penetrate that section. He also invited attention to the immense lumber resources of Lincoln county, and that there was approximately estimated as 7,500,000,000 feet board measure in sight west of Corvallis.

A letter was read by Major Langfitt, which the Board had received from G. A. Westgate of Albany, one of the largest wheat buyers and shippers in the state, in which were recited the great benefits received in the past by the farmers of the Willamette Valley during the days of the old Oregon Pacific Company competition when the vessels were carrying grain from Yaquina Bay and the great advantages that would again be afforded when vessels of a larger tonnage could again with the deepening of the harbor successfully compete for a share of the carrying trade.

Mr. Leese of Corvallis, presented a statement from the mayor of Corvallis in behalf of harbor improvements. Speaking for himself he said he was owner of many millions of feet of lumber. He contemplated building mills to cut, but was waiting the improvement of Yaquina harbor. He had orders from abroad but was unable to fill them as vessels drawing more water than they could safely enter this port were required. Judge J. J. Whitney of Albany, Hon. B. F. Jones of Lincoln county and Judge Palmer of Linn county, presented to the Board substantial arguments in support of continuing the improvements of the harbor.

Senator Fulton was present and spoke briefly on the subject, pledging himself to do everything in his power not only for this bay, but for every harbor on the coast that merited improvement by the National Government. A letter was also read from Congressman Hermann advocating continuance of the work.

At the conclusion of the meeting a vote of thanks was tendered the Board for the opportunity afforded for a public hearing.
