MAY LOSE INDUSTRY.

Wagon and Carriage Factory Likely to be Moved to Portland.

The following is from Thursday's Telegram:

The wagon and organ factory now at Corvallis may be brought to Portland.

Oregon has every facility for making wagons and heavy vehicles, and there is no good reason for such articles being shipped into this state when the investing of local capital could bring about the necessary production right at home.

"We had almost arranged to change the factory to Eugene," said Mr. Cramer, "in order to overcome the record of failure which was made before the present management took charge.

"Oregon-made wagons are just as good as the best of Eastern manufacture. We have just as tough wood, as good box material and our wood will take as glossy a polish as the finest of the Eastern product.

"I have thought considerably of the advantages of moving the factory to Portland. There are many things in favor of and some against the project. It is curious that there is not an exclusive wagon factory in this city.

Mr. Cramer is enthusiastic in his support of Oregon institutions, and is doing his share to build up the manufacturing interests of the state.
