The late heavy wind storm is the third that has visited this part of the state for the last thirty-six years.

Preparations are being made to repair and improve the old Farmers Hotel in this city. Improvements in all departments of the hotel will be made, rooms papered, and a general fixing up wherever needed.

The Portland market quotations quote onions at 70 to 80 cents. Farmers in this valley are holding their onions until they are offered a cent a pound by the dealers, 80 cents per hundred pounds for best grades being considered a little too low for profit.

PLAY A SCORELESS GAME

Junior Elevens Fight a Hard Battle for Honors.

The second elevens of the O. A. C. and U. of O. played a tie game Saturday afternoon on the local gridiron.

The field was muddy and slippery thus making the game slow and fumbling frequent. The second half was played in a driving rain, that was nearly turned to snow and the players suffered greatly from the cold.

From the start the Eugene lads made it looked bad for the home team, as it was plainly to be seen that they were much lighter than their opponents.

At the start of the first half, he ball was carried dangerously near the local's goal, but they secured the ball on downs and then by several good gains and fine punting by Captain Moores, and then a complete miss by Eugene, who attempted to punt, the ball was captured by O. A. C., who worked it down to Eugene's 15-yard line, but the latter finally got the ball and after several plays the first half ended on Eugene's 35-yard line.

During the second half O. A. C., through Moore, carried the ball to the visitors' 15-yard line, when Eugene punted to center of field and after a succession of line plays and punts the half was finished on the varsity 30-yard line. In this half Eugene again missed the ball while trying to punt. Moores made a 25-yard run in the second half on a fake punt.

Moores, Shannon and Espey all played good ball for the Aggies. Moores punting and end runs were good, and Shannon and Espey both played a good tackling game. Eugene did some fine line bucking and several times sent their man through for good gains.
