A BIG SLAUGHTER

As a Result Two Hundred and Fifty Ducks are Bagged.

The largest duck killing made in this part of the country for a long time was made on Tuesday of this week by C. M., W. J. and L. A. Hurlburt and sons and Mr. Lewelling, when they killed 250 widgeons, mallards and teal. The lot contained considerable more of the former than the two latter.

One hundred and fifty of the above number were brought to town on Thursday and the remainder were brought in today. The ducks were sold to Berry & Carl, who ship them to Page & Son, in Portland.

The Hurlburt brothers and Lewelling have brought three lots to Berry & Carl, the total number being 319 ducks. They receive 8 cents each for the teal, 15 cents for the mallards, and 20 cents for the widgeons, thus making a neat sum for their trouble.

The above number does not near cover the amount the parties have killed this season, but only shows those sold to Berry & Carl.

The record of the whole season's play has been the main factor in the selection, and the fact that a man played on a winning or losing team has not been taken into consideration."
