IN SANTO DOMINGO.

United States Warships Sent to Protect Americans.

Official dispatches have been sent to Rear Admiral Wise, commanding the training squadron now at Guantanamo instructing that officer to take immediate and effective steps for the adequate protection of American lives and property at the Dominican capital, limiting his action at all times tenets of international law. The warships Columbia and Hartford will also be ordered to the same locality. The admiral will land the necessary force of marines to afford ample protection to the plantation, where the engineer was recently killed by the natives.

OUR NEXT VICE-PRESIDENT.

Roosevelt and Fairbanks Will be the Rallying Cry.

Charles Warren Fairbanks, the senior United States senator from Indiana, will be the republican candidate for vice-president. He has yielded to President Roosevelt's wishes, and his friends here have not only ceased to counsel him against accepting the nomination, but recognizing that the demand is practically unanimous among party leaders, are lending their aid to its accomplishment. It can be stated as a fact that Senator Fairbanks has told the President that, while he will make no canvass for the nomination, and hopes the convention will select some one else, he will offer no objection if nominated.

ALL HOPE HAS VANISHED.

War Said to be Inevitable in the Far East.

The British foreign office is now waiting for the sound of the first gun of war. All hope for peace is past, and England turns more earnestly into protecting her interests in the Far East.

The Tokio correspondent of the Times tonight says the situation is regarded as hopeless, and that the voluntary subscriptions to the war fund exceed 2,000,000 yen.

A dispatch from the Pekin correspondent of the Times discusses the possibility of the flight of the Chinese court, and says it is perplexed by divided councils, but it is not likely to flee unless Russia attempts to invade inside the Great Wall.

The Russian fleet at Vladivostok is ready to sail. Korea is said to be the real point at issue.

FIFTY MILLION DOLLAR FIRE.

Twenty-five Business Blocks in Baltimore Burned to Ashes.

The largest fire in the history of Baltimore commenced on Sunday at 11 a. m. in the wholesale drygoods house of John T. Hurst & Co. on Liberty Street between Baltimore and Fayette Sts. Extending principally eastward, it has leveled almost the entire district between Lombard and Lexington streets, and from Howard to Commerce. All the principal newspaper offices, many public buildings, large wholesale stores, banks, warehouses and manufactories. The most conservative estimate of loss places it at \$50,000,000 with chances of increasing that amount, as the fire is still burning. Engines and engine companies, policemen and military companies, have been hurried to Baltimore from New York, Philadelphia and Washington. Live cinders have been carried half a mile or more, setting roofs on fire. The fire has already covered an area of three-quarters of a mile in length and a quarter of a mile in width, taking in many of the most important buildings in the city.

Owing to the wide extent of the calamity no approximate estimate can be made. The insurance is expected to reach twenty millions.

CONDITION UNCHANGED.

Senator Hanna's Illness Still Continues Without Improvement.

Washington, Feb. 6.—This morning at the Arlington hotel the bulletin was published that Senator Hanna's condition was unchanged. Drs. Rixby and Magruder will hold a consultation this forenoon.

At 10 o'clock another bulletin shows Hanna's temperature half a degree higher than yesterday. Dr. Rixley believes the disease is reaching its climax.

H. M. Hanna, of Thomasville, Ga., brother of Mark, was today wired to come to Washington at the request of Mrs. Hanna. Other members of the family were notified there was no immediate necessity of their presence.

ONCE MORE FREE.

Mrs. Maybrick Ends Her Fourteen Years Imprisonment.

Mrs. Maybrick is serving out the last few months of her life sentence for the killing of her husband, in the quiet country home of the Sisters of the Epiphany at Truro, Cornwall, under an assumed name and with her identity completely hidden. She is guarded from communication with the outside world as jealously as if she were still in Aylesbury prison. Her identity is unknown, even to the sisters.

"Mrs. Maybrick is still a prisoner and has not even been released on ticket of leave. Those in charge of her are practically her jailers, and all communication with her is forbidden, except through the home secretary." She will return to America on her final release.

Death of an Albany Citizen.

L. Senders, one of Albany's best known citizens, and a pioneer of Oregon, died at the North Pacific Sanitarium in Portland. Mr. Senders had long suffered from kidney trouble, and some time ago submitted to an operation. He recovered from the operation but stomach trouble set in and his general debilitated condition prevented his recovery. Leonidas Senders was born in Bosen, Germany, May 14, 1833. He came to America in the '50s, locating in Missouri. In 1862 he came to Oregon via the Isthmus of Panama, and in company with M. Sternberg established a mercantile business in Brownsville, Linn County. Later they came to Albany and continued the business. Mr. Senders accumulated considerable means and took an active interest in rebuilding Albany. He built several brick buildings and for some time was one of the largest dealers in blooded horses in the valley. He was a prominent figure in the Democratic councils of Linn County. The deceased was a member of the Masonic and Workmen fraternal orders. He is survived by two daughters and two sons: Mrs. Belle Lewis of Tacoma; Mrs. Amelia Kleinberg, of Ellensburg, Wash.; Morris and Albert Senders, of Albany. The remains were brought to Albany and interment took place Friday.
