The mail stage of Vidito Bros. tried to make the trip over this road, but found it impossible, and were obliged to return to Corvallis, and make the run over the West side road, which is some two miles longer. It was claimed by some of the people at the meeting, that the fact that a good road here would allow more people to go to Corvallis to obtain their supplies, in preference to Albany. This may not be a factor, but there are many who believe it. These people also state that the Benton county authorities keep and that Benton county people who live much nearer Albany than Corvailis, do most of their trading in the former city. No work has been done on this road of any consequence for several years, and it is certainly time to make a beginning.
