EDITOR GAZETTE:—As I write, a gentle breeze from the north floats through my window, laden with the perfume of thousands of wild flowers yielding up their sweetness from their homes in the meadow, or by the wayside. "Born to blush unseen" yet each adding its mite to the wealth of this valley in one form or another. Honey dew for the bee, health for the inhabitant. I contrast this soft, perfumed air with the more bracing ocean breezes at the beach, which I enjoyed the first of the week, and it is hard to decide which is the most enjoyable.
