lieving that Judge Hamilton has a record of 100 per cent. in affirmed cases before the Supreme Court. As a matter of fact, OF THE 26 CASES APPEALED FROM HIS DECISIONS ONLY 12 HAVE BEEN AFFIRMED. IN THE REMAINING 14 HIS JUDGMENTS WERE FOUND WRONG.

This is not a record that argues very strongly for Judge Hamilton's re-election. The reports of the Supreme Court show for themselves that he has made more errors than correct decisions in appealed cases.

He did get 100 per cent in Vol. 39 of the reports, but that volume had only ONE CASE from his court. This statement has been perverted and presented to the people, with the manifest intention to deceive. Look up the reports for yourself.

THE REPUBLICAN SLOGAN.

The reason why the Republicans urge a straight ticket in Oregon and Umatilla county are good ones and should be impressed upon the minds of every voter in the party.

It has been the purpose of the party since the primaries to make as good a showing in Oregon in June as possible.

With that end in view, strong, harmonious tickets were selected by county conventions. Past grievances were buried and factional strife was eliminated in every convention. Each ticket was a ticket of the people, and the voters being directly responsible for the choice made for each office feel obligated to its support.

The same conditions prevail throughout the state. As nearly as can be ascertained from various sources the Republicans are working in harmony and a straight ticket is the slogan of every campaign.

Republicanism has been exalted above party strife and personal hatreds and ambitions.

Because the state campaign is an "off" one, there being but two offices to elect, the activity of state politics has been transferred to county political campaigns.

Oregon Republicans know that they will fire the first guns of the national campaign and for President Roosevelt. The first signs of the times are significant. What Oregon does in June will be noted and commented upon more than any other feature of the national campaign. It will be an actual vote of the people, while other states will only hold conventions, make platforms and declare that victory is certain. The final act must be put off until November. Whether there will be a falling off or gain in Republicanism will be shown in Oregon in June in time to give a keynote to the campaign in other states. What the vote is in June it should be in November and what it will be in November it should be in June.

It is a peculiar duty that every Republican in Oregon owes his party to the national party, a straight ticket in June. Strong rousing majorities in all the counties is the way to impress the entire country with Oregon's adherence to Republican principles—Pendleton Tribune.

It is reported that the Democrats of Benton county are actually frantic in their efforts to defeat W. E. Yates, the Republican nominee for State Senator, even going so far as to jeopardize the chances of Judge Hamilton for re-election, if that would contribute to their purpose. But all this raving will avail them nothing. Mr. Yates has every qualification for an excellent legislator, is identified with the interests of Benton county, has long been known as one of its leading attorneys and should receive every Republican vote in that legislative district. This is no time for juggling with mere personal dislikes, if there be any, since the effectiveness of a political organization depends upon its success all along the line. There was no unfairness attending the nomination of Mr. Yates, he has all the qualifications for the position for which he has been named and the Republicans of Benton county should see that this particular Democratic game is blocked.—Salem Statesman.

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE.

EDITOR GAZETTE:—It is claimed by the Democratic managers of the county election, that Victor Moses is a deserving young man; has made a good clerk, and being a candidate for re-election, inferentially they argue that Republicans should abandon their own candidate, Mr. Scott, and vote for Mr. Moses. This is a mistake, because Mr. Scott is also a deserving young man; much more so in many respects than Mr. Moses. Mr. Scott, by natural qualities, is fitted to make a better clerk than Mr. Moses. Republicans should by all means vote for Mr. Scott, because he is a fine gentleman, well and thoroughly qualified. There are many other reasons why men should vote for Mr. Scott. There were several mistakes urged two years ago to elect Mr. Moses clerk. It was claimed that Mr. Moses' opponent had a farm and plenty of stock and other things, and hence the people should vote for Mr. Moses. What a subterfuge.

Let any sensible man think of it. But Mr. Moses' friends urged the same for his election. At the same time an anonymous pamphlet was circulated over the county, with no one to own its origin, against Mr. Moses' opponent, all showing conditions of mind not willing to be fair, but attempting to mislead the voter. In contrast with that argument, a few years ago the Democratic managers urged as a campaign measure that Mr. Rickard, then Democratic candidate for sheriff, had a farm and plenty of cattle and other property, and hence he should be voted for, and Mr. Waggoner, the Republican candidate, who had not been so fortunate as to accumulate so much property, should be voted against. It seems a poor rule that will not work the same whether the candidate be a Democrat or Republican. But the Democratic managers have for many years promulgated ridiculous, misleading statements as reasons to urge Republicans to vote for the Democratic candidates and prove recreant to the Republican nominees. Another great mistake has been made during this county election in Mr. Moses' behalf. Some of his ardent friends have falsely urged to the voters in several parts of the county that Mr. Scott, his opponent, is a large land owner and therefore Mr. Moses was more needy, and that Mr. Scott should be voted against in favor of Mr. Moses. These are campaign measures that no dignified, high-minded class of men would use. In our Republican form of government it is not a question whether a man has large or small property. Every man is recognized one as good as the other in our country, if he behaves properly and is honest and frank with his fellow man.

In the monarchies among kings of the old world, property and caste are made as distinctions between men, but in Oregon one man is as good as his neighbor, regardless of property considerations. Integrity, ability to perform duty, standing as a man among men with high-minded contentions for principle, and not subterfuge, should be the qualities the voter should look to in the man for whom he casts his vote. Mr. Scott possesses all these qualifications as highly as any man. Mr. Scott is not a large property owner: much less so than his opponent, but he is a man with high ideas of principle, of duty, and integrity of purpose and above all he is highly qualified for the office of county clerk.

Socialist Speaking.

Mr. T. J. McCleary, of Salem, addressed the people of Corvallis Tuesday night on the subject of Socialism.

It is to be regretted that the attendance was very small, owing to other meetings in the city. The speech was good, free from rancor, fair and unbiased and well worth the consideration of every one present. He spoke of the changes that have taken place by the introduction of labor-saving machinery and the enormous profits accruing to the capitalist as a direct consequence. He quoted from reliable statistics the wide difference between the cost and selling price of various articles and showed how the consumer or common people paid this difference. He advocated as a remedy the popular ownership of all such enterprises that had for their object the bleeding of the public. He stated that if the difference were put into a common fund, the amount accumulating in two years would be sufficient to purchase them all. Mr. McCleary, who is a well-to-do farmer of Marion county, is a forcible speaker and is working gratis for the good of the cause.

P. U. Wins Championship.

In the field meet with Pacific University on last Monday at Forest Grove the O. A. C. team was defeated by the score of 66 to 59. All afternoon the local telegraph office was crowded with students who eagerly awaited the returns of each event. Up to 6 o'clock the O. A. C. boys were three points in the lead. It was then reported that Smithson was thrown out in the 220 yd. dash for fouling and afterwards each report carried to the local students proved a disappointment and when the meet had ended at 8 o'clock it was found that O. A. C. was defeated by the small margin of seven points. The officials all belonged to P. U. and as a result most of the time was taken up settling disputes. Williams, who won the 220 dash in 22 1-5 tied the Coast record made by Pearson of the University of Washington a few months ago. Several watches caught Williams' time at 22 seconds flat, but the time was given out as stated above. Smithson and Williams had no trouble in winning from the much-talked-of Peterson, who could only get third place when the crack sprinters from O. A. C. were entered.

John Edwin Martin who has always lived with his mother became insane a few days ago and the shock together with other complications is supposed to have hastened her death. The death of Mrs. Martin is particularly sad when it is remembered that her son who was stricken with cerebral dropsy when but a year old, has been her constant care for forty years. A host of sympathizing friends accompanied the remains to the grave.
