Huard vs Kimball.

The case of Al Huard and E. M. Kimball that has been in the court for some time was up for adjudication in court, yesterday, and dismissed as being outside the court's jurisdiction. An altercation occurred about three months ago in which Huard shot Kimball for trespassing, nearly resulting fatally. Kimball petitioned the county court to lay out a road through Huard's land and this petition was up for decision yesterday and was not granted for this reason:

Kimball has another residence near the county road and he was living there at the time of registration which established that as his residence in the legal sense. The law requires that a petitioner must have actual residence on the land. Mr. Kimball will be required to take up his residence on the land in question which lies back from the county road and adjoining Huard's residence before he can have the petition granted. This Kimball fully intends to do. Huard is threatening violence even if the road is granted. Mr. Kimball is a well-educated, highly respected citizen, and will do what is right to have the matter adjusted.

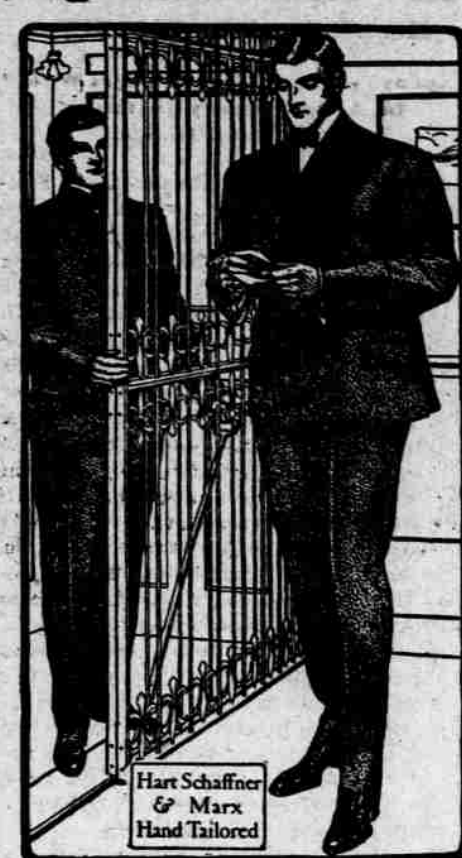
