Editorial Comment.

Is It a Freak?

A large cluster of red raspberries upon one of this year's stalks was brought into this office yesterday morning by S. N. Wilkins. This freak of nature may have happened before but it is so unusual, it has excited more than ordinary comment. It is well known that, ordinarily, raspberries, blackberries, and the like require two years to mature, and need excellent care even at that age to bring good results. Mr. Wilkins has four rows of these raspberries and the stalk from which the berries were taken was the strongest and most favorably located of all.

The patch is well protected on all sides with abundant sunshine during most of the day. The soil is spaded deep, well manured, pulverized, and over the whole is laid a thin mulching of straw. The old stalks were turned out last year soon after bearing so as to give the roots the benefit of rest, and likewise this year as soon as the berries were gathered the old stalks were removed and the young shoot topped. This is supposed to have been the cause of the phenomenon in question. The strength of the root when the parent stalk and the top of the young scion had been removed grew a sucker or false top upon the young shoot, and upon this the beautiful large clusters of berries grew.

There is no doubt but that the extra care bestowed by Mr. Wilkins, together with the opportune removal of useless dead material caused the supposed freak. In this accidental discovery, there is food for thought to berry raisers. It may be that, with proper care, a whole year may be saved. The stalk we have in our possession bore twenty blossoms and eleven large, full-sized berries.

Good Advice on Ginseng Business

Look out for ginseng and mushroom companies that tell you how you can make a great amount of money with only a little labor and only a very little land or cellar room. Especially look out for the companies that promise to buy all you can raise, at a fixed price, no matter what the price is. Do not undertake to grow ginseng or mushrooms either, until you have visited some honest man who is making a success of the business. Many women in moderate circumstances are continually asking if they can support themselves by growing ginseng in their little gardens.

Prof. L. A. Clinton, director of Storrs Agricultural Experiment Station, Connecticut, says, "I have investigated carefully the ginseng industry of Central New York, having visited many gardens, and I am certain there is no profit whatever for the ordinary farmer. If one desires to purchase a few ginseng seeds, or better yet, a few roots, to experiment with, he will probably receive information enough to pay him for the money expended; but he should not be much disappointed if he receives no returns from his investment, and he should charge up the money spent as tuition for his education."
