Philomath Petition.

A petition is being circulated in Philomath, with a view to find out how many property owners will patronize an electric light plant. It is necessary to secure at least an income of \$75 a month to justify the erection of a plant. If the citizens take hold of the matter promptly, the plant will be put in at once.

Arch Horning, of Philomath Mill company is at the head of the enterprise and all he asks is a guarantee that a sufficient number of patrons will use lights to justify the expenditure. The plant can be put up in about 50 days. Philomath is a good town and is growing rapidly with a bright future before it. There are three enterprises, however, that she needs at once, a flouring mill, newspaper and an electric light plant, the last of which will necessarily be needed first.

There is at present a demand for houses, all available ones being already rented and inquiries for more are coming in daily. Electric lights for Philomath will greatly increase the value of property and at the same time being less expensive than oil and far more convenient. Mr. Horning asks that the citizens agree to take the lights for at least two years upon the following schedule: The first light, 16 candle power to cost \$1 per month, the second 50 cents and all additional and eight candle power lights at the rate of 25 cents each. Two circuits will be operated, one to run all night, the other will be closed at eleven o'clock and will be suitable for students. Those behind the project are very anxious that Philomath citizens should take hold of the enterprise and push it along.
