Editorial Comment.

Portland won the Sunday afternoon game with the Oakland nine, in eleven innings, with a score of 5 to 4. Good for the Browns.

The dismantling of the Russian Cruiser Askold, and the torpedo boat destroyer Grozovoi, began on Monday. These are the two vessels that sought shelter in the Chinese port of Shanghai.

The cable ship Burnside on Sunday afternoon at 4:40, completed the splice of the Alaska cable with Seattle, and messages were sent and received from Sitka. This line is 800 miles long, and was laid at a cost of \$1000 per mile. The two terminals are Valdez, Alaska, and Seattle, Washington.

The New York Times, one of the leading Democratic papers of New York City, characterizes the utterances in Judge Parker's letter of acceptance relating to the Tariff as "old, tiresome, nerveless, spineless rigmarole." Brother Parker's daily prayer ought to be "deliver me from my friends."

To the plain every-day Democrat the beautiful lack of harmony between the party platform and nominee Parker's letter of acceptance must be the source of great perplexity. The platform must surely express the principles, policies and purposes of the great Democratic party. It was formulated by the mighty and wise men of the party, assembled for that purpose. Judge Parker's letter of acceptance, including his gold standard-telegram, must be equally a correct and authoritative statement of Democratic principles, policies and purposes. Why not? He is a lie-long Democrat. He voted for Bryan and free-coinage. Cleveland and Hill and Belmont vouch for the "simon pure" quality of his Democracy. So sure were they of this they were able to induce the convention to pass over such doubtful Democrats as Gorman, Bryan and Hearst and give the nomination to Parker.

Little wonder that our plain, honest, every-day Democrat is mystified, perplexed. He turns to the history of his party to learn what Democracy really is, and finds that for quite forty years the party has had no definite principles and no policies but those of negation and obstruction. Its brief lease of power within that time but emphasized its unfitness to conduct the government and caused the Ameri-

can people to regard it with distrust. The party is discredited, and the St. Louis platform nor Judge Parker's letter, separately or combined can restore it to public confidence.

Another Pioneer Gone.

On last Sunday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock at the family residence occurred the funeral discourse of Mrs. Mary M. McLagan, preached by Rev. Edward F. Green of the Congregational church. The last sad rites were observed at the I. O. O. F. cemetery where the remains were laid in the final resting place. Mrs. McLagan was ill but a few days, having taken sick suddenly on Tuesday, the 16th inst., and grown gradually worse until the end, which came on Friday morning at 11 o'clock on her 77th birthday. She had been in poor health for many years and had borne her infirmities with patient courage and Christian fortitude, but her advanced age made recovery rather doubtful. Mrs. McLagan was born near Bath Steuben county, New York, Aug. 26, 1827. While quite young she emigrated with her parents locating near Sycamore, DeKalb county, Ill. where she resided for many years and where she married Wm. McLagan, Nov. 26, 1848. Mrs. McLagan is the last of a family of ten children. April 15, 1852 Mr. and Mrs. McLagan left Sycamore for Oregon in a wagon drawn by oxen, arriving in Portland Oct. 15 just six months later. In March, 1853 they came to Corvallis where they have resided most of the time since.

Eight children were born to Mr. and Mrs. McLagan, six of whom are living and with a husband remain to mourn her loss. The daughters are Mrs. Ida L. Spencer and Mrs. A. M. Tucker of Corvallis, and May E. Motley of Cove, Oregon. One son, Rollo A. McLagan resides here, another son, O. C. McLagan, is in Alaska, while a third, Douglas McLagan, resides in California.

Will Test Local Option Law.

The constitutionality of the local-option law will be tested in the courts of Multnomah county, and a bill of complaint will be filed soon by persons interested in defeating the law. It will take the form of a suit to enjoin County Clerk Fields from submitting the question to the voters at the election in November whether liquors shall be sold in Multnomah county, as petitioned for by I. H. Amos and 527 others, principally members of the Prohibition party. The petition filed demands that the clerk shall place on the ballot the question of prohibition to be answered yes or no.

The attorneys who are preparing the injunction suit do not desire at this time to state what points they will make against the constitutionality of the law, any more than to say that it will be attacked from all sides. The matter of testing the law has been under consideration since the election in June.—Oregonian.
