EXCURSIONS TO SHOWS

Will Be Run on C. & E. When Ringling Exhibits in Albany.

The big Ringling shows and circuses will be in Albany September 1, and on this occasion excursion trains will be run on the Corvallis & Eastern railroad from both ends of the line, at a fare for the round trip not to exceed \$1. Two special trains will both arrive in Albany before the street parade, which will be held at 10 a. m. on Thursday, September 1. The train from Yaquina will leave that place at 5:15 a. m. arriving at Albany at 9:35; the one from Detroit will leave that place at 6:25, arriving in Albany at 9:25 a. m., giving the passengers ample time to see the parade. Both trains will leave the Albany station for the return trip at 6 p. m., thus giving ample time to visit the big Ringling shows for the afternoon performance.
