Editorial Comment.

"Judge Parker is not a fit man to be nominated by the democratic party or any other party." This assertion was made by William Jennings Bryan in his Chicago speech of April 23rd, 1904. Continuing, Mr. Bryan said:

"For a year he has been urged to speak out and declare himself upon the important issues of the coming campaign, but he has remained silent."

If this silence meant that nobody knew his views, those who have been loyal to the party in recent years would stand upon an equal footing with those who deserted, but it is evident now that while to the public generally his views are unknown, they are well known to those who are urging his nomination. Whatever doubt may have existed on this subject heretofore has been dispelled by the platform adopted by the New York State convention, and taking this platform as a text, I am sanguine enough to believe that I can prove to every unbiased mind that Judge Parker is not a fit man to be nominated either by the Democratic party or by any other party that stands for honesty and fair dealing in politics."

What a wonderful unanimity of opinion there is among prominent Democrats. There are many others that agree with you, William.

Loses A Foot.

An accident occurred Thursday evening about 7 o'clock, as a result of which Matt George has lost his left foot. Mr. George is about 55 years of age and lives across the river in Linn county. Mr. George was employed to guard the hop house of Mrs. Anna Beach and started in company with his grandchild over to the building about half past seven. There have been a number of fires of late, some of them evidently the work of a firebug, that Mrs. Beach thought it wise to guard against any possible danger so George was employed for the work.

When he arrived at the hop-house he set his shotgun down against the building and proceeded to open the door when the jar caused the gun to slide down upon the ground and discharge. The entire contents of the barrel lodged in his left ankle so shattering the bones and tearing away the flesh that it was necessary to have the foot removed. When the nature of the wound was ascertained, the boy

ed a bandage tightly about Mr. George's ankle to stop the flow of blood. He then ran to the house and with the aid of his son hitched a horse to a buggy and drove back to the hop house and got Mr. George into the buggy and took him home. Upon examination D. S. Farr and Fernot found it impossible to save the foot and it was consequently amputated. Mr. George is now resting easy.

For A Hard Fight.

Local opinion promises to be the all absorbing one in Oregon this fall. Most people have settled down to believe that everything will go to Roosevelt anyway and are looking for a fight in another direction. The fight has evidently been found, judging from what has transpired within the last few days and it will probably be one of the most bitter contests in the history of the state. The fight will not be along party lines, neither will many papers enter the fight. The latest move is from the Oregonian which attacks the validity of the local option law upon the following grounds:

Because it was not submitted to the Governor for his approval, was not signed by him, nor returned with his objections, nor filed by him in the office of the Secretary of State, that the law was not legally submitted to the electors, because the petition for its submission was not signed by eight per cent of the voters; that it confers an unlawful delegation of legislative authority to the county court; that title does not give notice that it is unlawful to sell liquor; that the initiative and referendum act is contrary to the Constitution of the United States, wherein a republican form of government is guaranteed; that it unlawfully prohibits the sale of liquor on the prescription of a physician not engaged in practice; that it is contrary to section 21 of the Constitution; that it unlawfully attempts to delegate the prohibition question to precincts, and that it provides for illegal search-warrants and rules of evidence.

A New Steamer.

According to a special from Marshfield to the Oregonian a new coast steamer, the Toledo, will make regular trips from Eureka, Cal. to Yaquina Bay, taking in Coos Bay. This is part of a plan supposed to be backed by Claus Spreckles to tap Oregon resources. Already Coos Bay is more a part of California, for there is regular weekly passenger service between Coos Bay and San Francisco.

Coos Bay, however, is seeking to induce Portland capital to put on a line of steamers between Marshfield and the Oregon Metropolis. The steamer, Toledo, will be a benefit in two ways; a new market will be found for valley products and there will be a saving of four hours time for commercial travellers who wish to stop at Gardner and Coos Bay.
