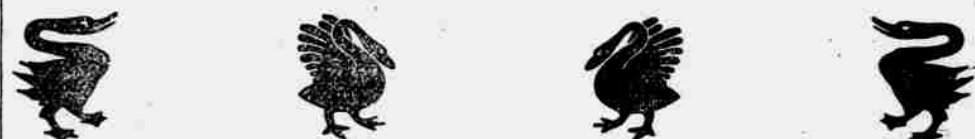

The Benton county display at the State Fair got only fifth place but the Oregonian said that in some respects it was the best of all. Of course we are compelled to concede the palm but we will not kick about it as Marion did but will do better next time. One thing in particular against Benton's display was the small sheaves of grain, which although as good as the others did not look as well to the booth. Both Mr. French and Mrs. Whitby are deserving of unstinted praise for their efforts to represent Benton county. The city of Corvallis also ought to make more of an effort along this line. This city did not do her share by any means toward making the county display a success.

The Lewis and Clark exhibit from Benton county is now being prepared and will be taken to the National Grange which meets in Portland this fall. From there it will be taken to the Lewis and Clark exposition building. The county court in its disposition of prize money ought to be very liberal. Money matters ought not to be allowed to interfere with the success of this exhibit.

Football Outlook.

The outlook for a successful year for the football team is very hopeful. A training table will be started, at which all expecting to enter either team will be expected to board. Mr. Steckle hopes to be able to interest a large number of students in actual football practice so as to have as large a number as possible from which to choose men to fill vacancies.

There are an unusually large number of men, physically well qualified to play football, but many have never had the experience with the game and need to be interested. Practice is going on steadily each day from four until six and the time will be gradually lengthened as the men all get into fixed positions and are able to stand harder practice. The old men are all back with the exception of two and these positions have to be filled. The positions of quarterback and also one of the ends will have to be filled. Rose and Rhinehart are spoken of as possible men for the two positions, but other material may develop later.

The first game of the season will probably be between the Alumni of the College and the regular team Oct. 1. This is yet uncertain, but if the old stars can be brought together the game will come off. The first scheduled game of the season is Oct. 8, with the Portland Medics, the next with Seattle Oct. 15, and the great game of the season will be with the Utah Agricultural college Oct. 22.

An Interesting Meeting.

On Wednesday last, Bishop H. C. Morrison, after addressing the students at the College, went with Rev. Reeves to visit John Rickard and family living about twelve miles south. The Bishop who is interested in the new and growing church at Portlano, was hunting subscriptions for the new church. Mr. Rickard's well known liberality to the churches was the occasion of the visit. Seated by the open fire, talking about where they came from, to the surprise of both parties, the conversation developed the fact that back in Montgomery county Tenn., Mrs. Rickard's brother had married the Bishop's sister, fifty years ago. It is sufficient to say the Bishop did not come away disappointed.
