EVERY MAN'S DUTY.

Every qualified voter should go to the polls on election days and cast his ballot. This is the only way we can maintain a government by the people, or learn the will of the majority in any matter submitted to the people. It is not of unfrequent occurrence that because numbers of men have failed to vote, a minority, and not always a wise one, has been invested with powers and rights intended only for the majority. To prevent this and to ensure the rule of the majority, all men should vote.

It is the duty of every patriotic and qualified citizen to vote. No slight cause should prevent him from exercising this duty. He owes it to himself and to his party, and his failure to do so is evidence that he is not an ideal American citizen.

A just feeling of state pride as well as a high, patriotic sense of civic duty should impel him to the polls. It would be unfortunate, indeed, if the vote cast next month shows a falling off from our total of 93,000 cast last June. The political contest in the state of Washington will bring out the full vote of that state. It is estimated that Washington will poll 125,000 votes, the 24th of next month. It would be a humiliating contrast for Oregonians if this state should cast but 84,000 votes, the number cast four years ago. It would give the press of the whole country, and especially that of the state of Washington fair opportunity to make hurtful comparison.

For several reasons the eyes of the country are directed on Oregon. We cannot gain prestige by supineness. We must show to the country our growth in population. We must give expression to our high sense of civic duty, and our purpose to advance the interests of the state. We can do this most effectively by casting our entire vote next month. Let every man, regardless of party, go to the polls and use all right means to induce his neighbors to do likewise.

DISGUSTED.

When Judge Parker said that he elected he could not give his views on tariff the force of laws during the four years of his administration because the sen-

ate must necessarily remain Republican during his term of office, it was not only a bid for the support of the protectionists and radical revisionists, but it was such a weak straddling of of the tariff question that it disgusted ex-President Cleveland. The tariff plank of the democratic platform was very acceptable to Mr. Cleveland. He regarded it as a vindication of his policy of radical revision undertaken during his second term. He professed to believe that tariff revision on these lines should have been grasped by candidate Parker as a real issue, on which not only New York but the country might be carried by the Democratic party. Parker had promptly whistled the gold standard tune Cleveland, Hill and A. Belmont had composed for him. Free silver was now abandoned and doubtless tariff revision, on his lines would be the issue. But Parker's tariff music so far has been played in minor keys. He may be conscious that defeat would fall upon any candidate advocating Cleveland's radical ideas of tariff revision, but it is certain he lacks courage to take that up as the one paramount issue of the campaign. Then, too, Gorman was called virtually to manage Parker's campaign, Gorman who of all Democratic leaders has ever been most out of line with the party on this question. Cleveland's disgust became deeper and his unwillingness to participate in the campaign became more marked.

It is a fact that Parker's campaign, from its inception, has not received a perfunctory support from many of the gold Democrats of New York notwithstanding his gold standard dispatch. The reason is that Parker never had any show for election. Even those elements in both parties which oppose Roosevelt and desire the election of a president over whom they might exercise some sort of control have given up all hopes of Judge Parker's election. They now see the purposes of the management of his campaign. Hill, Sheenan and the junta they represent seek to gain control of the party organization, to eliminate Bryan, and most of all to gain control of New York for their own exploitation.

This is the reason why the Democratic party has been run on such low levels and why it fails to appeal forcibly to thousands of patriotic Democrats. Democrats are disgusted with their party management.

The Utah-Washington Game.

It develops that the score in the Utah-Washington game of football at Seattle on Saturday, in no way represents the strength of the two teams, and the resultant inference is Wednesday's game on OAC field will be a good one. In spite of the strenuous exertions of Coach Knight, the Washington men earned but a single touchdown in the first half. A second was made on a fluke and a long run in the last half minute of play. There were fifteen minutes of play in the first half before a touchdown was made, and in the time, Utah had rushed the Washington players back to within a few yards of a touchdown for Utah. For a time in the opening of the second half, the Utah men made yardage constantly through the Washingtonians, but when one of their punts was blocked and a Washingtonian seized the ball and made off for a touchdown trouble began for the men from Utah. A second instance of this kind soon followed and then the Utah eleven went to pieces allowing the Washington boys to make five touchdowns in the last five minutes of play. This is the statement of George Campbell, coach of the Utah eleven, who says the score is out of all proportion to the relative strength of both teams and who expects his men to play good strong ball in Wednesday's game with OAC. The Utah men are heavy and were not scored against last year.

The "Mystic Midgets" Cantata, given under the direction of Prof. Collins, at the opera house last Friday and Saturday nights, was well attended and from the frequent applause and encores evidently pleased the well filled house on both nights. The entertainment was under the auspices of the OAC Athletic Association and netted them a neat sum. While all did well, for the amount of training given them, Miss Kathryn Daniel, as Prince, and Miss Edna Allen, as Queen, were especially deserving of praise. The jockey girls seemed to be favorites with the audience and easily carried off the honors of the evening. Music was furnished by Prof. Sydney Hayes of Albany, assisted by several of our Corvallis Musicians.

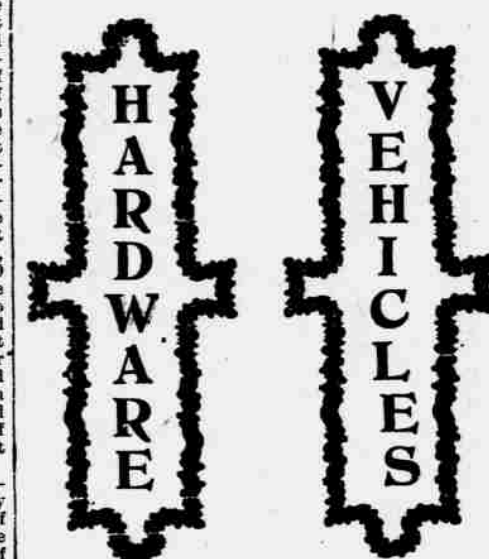
