OAC SEOND TEAM DEFEATED.

Go Down Before Second Team of University of Oregon.

The husky farmer boys from Corvallis went down in gallant defeat before the second team of the University of Oregon Saturday by a score of 8 to 5.

Both teams lacked defensive work, while the offensive work of both was very good. U. of O. having a little the best of it.

The U. of O. scored their touchdown a few minutes after the opening of the game, and from that on it looked as though the game was an easy mark, but alas! that farmer sprinter Stimpson on the first down after the kick off, secured the ball on the 85-yard line and ran the length of the field with the pack at his heels for a touchdown. The fact could hardly be realized by the rooters, and the score was made by a streak of luck. In the second half the varsity found the weak points and worked that line like a machine, netting from 5 to 15 yards at a clip. From the kick-off the varsity backs took the ball three successive times for 7 yards apiece, followed soon after by a 15-yard run by Holmes.

On a fumble the OAC got the ball and the full fell back to boost the pigskin, but alas! some man on the farmers' side blocked the kick, the ball rolling behind the goal posts, where an OAC man fell on it. Thus U. of O. received two more points.

The best men on the OAC team were the quarter and the left half, while on the U of O team every man was a star, Kuykendall and Holmes showing up exceptionally well.

The game was worth the admission price, and everything was done on the square, the officials being very impartial.—Eugene Register.

Mrs. Lawrence Wilhelm Dies Suddenly.

The sad intelligence reaches this city of the sudden death of Mrs. Lawrence Wilhelm, who died at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Read in Lebanon, Saturday morning at 4 o'clock.

Mrs. Wilhelm's maiden name was Florence Read, and she formerly lived at Monroe, where she has many devoted friends, who mourn her sudden passing away. In 1898 she was united in marriage to Mr. Lawrence Wilhelm, and was a devoted wife and mother. She is survived by her husband and three children, the youngest being about two weeks old.

Truly it often seems true that "the good and beautiful die young," Mrs. Wilhelm was but 24 years of age, yet if the duration of human life may be expressed by the number of friends won and left to mourn, Mrs. Wilhelm's brief earthly existence was equal to double her years.

Her funeral was held Monday morning at St. Mary's Catholic church at Monroe, Rev. Father Springer, of Corvallis, officiating. Followed by a large concourse of surviving and sympathizing friends, her remains were laid to rest in the Monroe Catholic cemetery, there to await the day of promised resurrection.

The Fatal Wedding.

Nvxt Friday evening, Nov. 4, the patrons of the Opera House will have a pleasant surprise in store for themselves, when the big New York melodrama, "The Fatal Wedding" will play an engagement at Corvallis. The plot is a powerful one, and deals with the adventures of a scheming woman, who, assisted by a male accomplice, ventures the ruin of a happy family, and the separation of a wife from husband and children, in order that she can contract a marriage with the husband and thereby gain his fortune. She is prevented from doing this, however, by the timely interference of two characters, a Frenchman and an Irish servant woman who in their respective parts make no end of amusement for the audience. An unusually strong cast will interpret the play and the scenic effects are the most realistic ever attempted in melodrama. One scene in particular, that of the famous Palisades at night, showing the counterfeiter's den, gives a great effect, and with the many revolving scenes go to make up as strong a scenic production as has yet been witnessed in this city.

The inventor of the new American gun is a man named J. Hamilton Brown, though the work of constructing this particular six-inch experimental piece is in charge of Colonel John M. Ingalls, retired U. S. A., an artilleryman of high standing and reputation. Despite the incredulity of cotemporary gun-builders, Colonel Ingalls and officers with him assert that this six-inch gun will throw thirty miles a projectile weighing 100 pounds which will pierce a six-inch steel target. A ten-inch gun of this construction, with a powder chamber of 14,259 cubic inches and using 300 pounds of smokeless powder, would hurl a six-hundred projectile a distance of fifty-nine miles. Increasing this ratio, a sixteen-inch gun would have an extreme range of more than one hundred miles, and equipped with such coast-defense rifles, England and France could shell each other across the Channel.—New Fighting Machines, Everybody's Magazine for November.

Serious Accident.

Saturday morning, James Herron while on his way to Corvallis was struck in the head by a stray 22 calibre rifle bullet. The miniature ball penetrated the hat band and scalp but flattened when it struck the skull and deviated in its course travelling partially around the head beneath the scalp and lodged near the temple. The ball came from a rifle in the hands of two young Corvallis boys who were out hunting and did not know that Mr. Herron was near. Mr. Herron was riding along in his wagon when he was struck and did not see the boys nor hear the report of the gun, but he explains that he suddenly felt a bump on the head as though struck with a club. A moment later the blood began to stream down his face and he hurried to town a mile distant where a physician removed the bullet and dressed the wound. The boys when questioned did not know that any harm had been done which was undoubtedly true. Mr. Herron is a prominent farmer living south of here and the boys belong to prominent Corvallis families. The boys had never been permitted to go hunting and were out at the time without the knowledge of their parents. The affair is deeply regretted and relief is felt that the accident did not result more seriously.

Artisans' Reception.

Thursday evening the United Artisans of Corvallis, tendered a reception to the Supreme Master of the order in the United States, J. W. Hudson.

J. Fred Yates presided, and after a short literary program consisting of several recitations and music by the Woodcock-Irvine orchestra had been rendered, he introduced Supreme Master Artisan Hudson, who gave a very patriotic and inspiring address, and a succinct history of the organization, purposes and rapid growth of the order, which was organized in Portland, about ten years ago by two brothers, F. I. and C. W. McKenna. It has had a wonderful growth and has been firmly established in nearly every state and in several foreign countries.

At the close of the address, all present sat down to a bountiful supply of refreshments, and the remainder of the evening was devoted to the offices of good fellowship.

Price of Hops.
