The season for canning salmon is over at the Bay and the fishermen have gone home. At least fifteen thousand cases have been put up at the three canneries, Alsea, Siletz and Yaquina. This means at least \$75,000 to the people engaged in this industry.

Rev. C. L. McCauslan, presiding elder of the Willamette district of the M. E. Church, South, arrived Friday from Albany and conducted services Sunday morning and evening for the Corvallis congregation. Communion services were held in morning following the regular preaching. Rev. McCauslan left yesterday for Lewisville, Or.

McCauley Porter went to Portland, Wednesday and returned Friday evening. He carried back with him a sixty dollar shotgun of the Parker manufacturing. He says if it should prove too difficult for him to shoot china pheasants, he will give the gun to his grandsons who can bring them down nearly every time. Mr. Porter is 75 years while his brother, William is 85 years old.

That there is a big profit in turkeys for farmers was brought clearly to mind last Friday when N. O. Dodge, of Bellfountain, brought in a part of his season's hatch and received a check from Smith & Boulden for \$91. Mr. Dodge had four hens and one gobbler last spring and succeeded in raising 75 young turkeys. During the summer he fed them very little and last week after keeping 24 of the birds at home he brought 51 to Corvallis with the above result.

The south window of A Hodes' store is one of the most attractively dressed windows to be seen on Main street. In front of a miniature miner's cabin is spread out an extended plain formed of crushed quartz. In the center of this is a lakelet in which are seen several kinds of water-fowl and also little water-crafts. Palms and evergreen shrubs are growing near the cabin, and the whole plain is strewn with rich galena and silver bearing ores brought from Idaho. The effect is very pleasing and attracts much notice.

Five hundred and four catfish were caught in a few hours time in a lake a few miles south of Corvallis last Friday by six men, P. C. Stewart, G. C. Greer, M. P. Fruit, Alec Shick, Carl Porter and another gentleman whose name we have not learned. This is almost unbelievable but the fish were brought into town and exhibited on the streets and divided up among the friends of the men who caught them. The fish were of good edible quality and ranged in length from eight to eighteen inches and the men say too that it wasn't an extra good day for fishing either.

A series of interesting experiments are being conducted by Prof. A. B. Cordley with Chinese lady bugs as a possible foe of the destructive San Jose scale. Recently he paid a visit to Jacksonville, where he left a number of the insects in the orchard of Peter Britt, a year ago last September. He found that the bugs had taken to the undergrowth and could not be found. While Prof. Cordley was disappointed in not being able to find any of them, he thinks it is likely possible that they are still there but because of the density of the undergrowth they may have escaped his notice. However, he says he will secure more of them from China and will make another trial.

Former Resident Dead.

Two short paragraphs in Thursday's Oregonian tells of the sickness and death of Nathan Gird for many years a resident of Benton county. Many citizens will remember him as he was connected with the brick stables, but that was years ago. "Nate" was a bronco buster and horse trainer and died at the Poor Farm a week ago Sunday, broken in body from the rough usage received in his many encounters. He was buried the following Monday in Lone Fir cemetery, the expenses being borne by the stablemen at Frazier & McLean's stables where he formerly worked. Frazier & McLean were formerly proprietors of the brick stables here. Gird was only 45 years old at the time of his death, but the strains encountered in his business broke down his constitution before his time, and for the last year he has been sick past recovery. He was at Good Samaritan Hospital as long as his money lasted, and his friends could afford to keep him there, but finally he was sent to the Poor Farm.
