Birds Wanted

Professor Shaw of the Oregon Agricultural College has sent an interesting display of birds to the National Grange which is in session at Portland this week. The birds were all of the weed-seed destroying species. Each one is carefully mounted and each one has a case by itself. There are a dozen birds in this display which is only a small part of the large number belonging to the species. In the crow of one of the birds there were found 1400 seeds of noxious weeds. The purpose of the display is to educate the farmers on the value of these birds and prevent if possible the destruction going on. Professor Shaw is now and has been for the past year and a half preparing an exhibit of mounted birds for the Lewis and Clark Fair. He has nearly 150 specimens so far and will secure as many more as possible. He is making an effort to produce a display as complete as possible but has had many difficulties to surmount in securing suitable birds. His collection at the present time is composed largely of small birds and he desires the assistance of people everywhere in the state in securing specimens of the larger birds. He desires right now to secure wild geese, ducks, brant, eagles and large owls. Professor Shaw will gladly go after these specimens if he knows or if someone will tell him where they are. The college will bear all expense in shipping, etc. and desires very much that an interest be created along this line. The entire collection when completed will be sent to the Lewis and Clark Fair and after that event will be brought back to Corvallis and placed in the Agricultural Hall at the college as a permanent museum.

The specimens already mounted by Professor Shaw are very fine and he is sparing no pains to make his work as complete and successful as possible.
