Grangers Visit Corvallis.

Four hundred delegates of the National Grange came in on a special Tuesday and spent a few hours in our city and at the Oregon Agricultural College. There were 300 when they left Portland, but a number were picked up along the way and 400 were seated at the long tables in the Armory, where a banquet was served the distinguished visitors.

When the train arrived here about 10 o'clock, four hundred grangers headed by the College band were in waiting as an escort and a number of citizens were there to bid them welcome. The visitors were escorted to the College Armory where dinner was served. After dinner was over and while the guests were seated at the table, Dr. Withycombe called for an address of welcome by Hon. J. K. Weatherford, president of the Board of Regents. This was followed by Professor F. C. Berchold, one of the faculty. Both gentlemen made happy allusions befitting the occasion and then the National master, Aaron Jones, responded in behalf of the National Grangers and other local visitors.

During the dinner the Band was stationed in the west gallery and gave excellent selections which were repeatedly encored.

The visitors were then taken in squads over the buildings and grounds until the hour arrived to leave. The professors acted as guides. At 2 o'clock the party started on its return to Portland by way of Albany, having come over the West Side. At Albany the train made a stay of 30 minutes. Flowers and fruit in abundance were distributed among the Grangers and in return the people were privileged to hear a short address from Governor N. J. Batchelder of New Hampshire. The whole occasion was one of the happiest in the history of this city and without exception the visitors were pleased with the beautiful Willamette Valley.
