TALE OF RUSSIAN BRAVERY.

An Instance of the Patriotic Fraternity Which Sometimes Controls the Soldiers.

There are probably no soldiers in the world more patriotic than are the Russians. They are blindly devoted to the cause of the "great white father," who rules them with an iron hand, and the extremest sacrifices are made by them cheerfully whenever the emergency requires them, says a London exchange. Here is a story of Russian bravery: There is a monument in Turkestan to several Russian soldiers captured by the Turcomans in 876. They were artillerymen, and their guns were captured with them, so the Turcomans naturally ordered them, on penalty of death, to serve those guns against their own comrades. Every man refused, choosing death by horrible torture and dying without a murmur.

This passion for self-sacrifice is the keynote of the Russian character, and is cultivated in the army by every possible means. The recruit is invariably told the story of that heroic company of infantrymen in the Lomakin expedition into Turkestan, who, at a critical moment, threw themselves into a deep ditch in order that the guns, which were sorely needed at the front, might be galloped over their bodies. It is doubtful whether this could have happened in any army but the Russian.

If there is one thing in which the Russian army excels it is marching. Lord Roberts' famous march to Kandahar has been equaled over and over again by czar's troops in the central Asia campaigns.

When Gen. Kuropatkin marched a force of Turkestan troops to join Skobeloff in the attack on Geok Tepe he and his men were swallowed up in an unknown, trackless desert for 26 days, yet they covered over 40 miles a day and marched in at the end of the time in perfect military order without a single man sick or fallen out. It was a wonderful feat, but it was not regarded in Russian military circles as being anything extraordinary.

A former captain of the Russian army told me of a friend of his who lived for years in a small town and was then ordered to St Petersburg. In less than six months he received a command to return and promptly blew his brains out.

"Nobody was surprised," said my friend. "We all know what life in such places is like. A man can be happy in Siberia on a lonely outpost where he has no companions of his own rank within 100 miles, but there is no happiness possible in a small Russian garrison town for a man of average intelligence."

A HAINAN GATE SYMBOL.

Odd Object of Mythical History Recently Received in New York City.

A curio importer in Broadway has received from Hainan, China, a strange symbol to be set up on the gatepost of a fashionable Newport residence, says the New York Times.

The symbol consists of the bones of a python molurus. In Hainan, its jungle home, it grows to between 20 and 30 feet long, has fearful teeth in its upper jawbones, and a double series of shields on the outer surface of the tail. This particular beast was killed by the villagers on account of its wicked appetite. It has a genealogy that beats that of almost any famous family in New York. Its father and mother held a cave-home for years. The old man-python used to suffocate harmless Chinamen by enveloping them in his coils, seizing them by the head, and gradually drawing them down into his interior. The pythoness-mother made away with the juicy sheep of the neighborhood. Underneath the bones will be a plate with the quotation from Bacon, "Saith the Pythonissa to Saul, to-morrow thou and thy sons shall be with me."

New England Woman Makes Discovery That No Provision Is Made for Company.

Such a thing as a guest room in an ordinary flat is apparently undreamed of. This lack seemed very heathenish to me, and I insisted that one of my five rooms should be set aside as sacred to the chance guest. One day when I was expecting two very dear friends, I was moved to mention my pleasant anticipation to my next neighbor, a bride of a few months. Her concern for me in what she evidently regarded as a predicament was funny.

"Company?" she exclaimed. "Going to stay two weeks? What in the world will you do with them? Why do you know, we've never even let my husband's folks know about our marriage just for that very reason. I haven't a place for company—and they're just the kind that would flock to visit us—country folks, you know—Fred's people all live in Rochester."

SHARP POINT OF LETTERS.

Mail Clerk Complains of Pins Used in Epistles—Gets Many Digs During Day.

"If people must stick pins in their letters, I wish they would cover up the points so they wouldn't push through," said a mail clerk, whose hands were disfigured by tiny scratches, relates the New York Times. "I'll bet I get 100 digs a day from pins that systematic folks use to hold their correspondence together. I never could make out, anyway, why so many letters need to be finished off with a pin. Of course, I understand that about half of those written by women have a postscript in the shape of a sample of dress goods or newspaper clippings, which perhaps require a pin or two to hold them in place, but even that habit cannot account for the large number of letters that come through the post office with a pin sticking out of one corner. I have come to the conclusion that many writers so nail their manuscript with malicious intent. It may not be as fellows in the postal service against whom they hold a grudge, but we are the ones that usually get the benefit of those pins."

TRINQUET, ORIGIN OF TENNIS

Popular Game Came from Ancient Pastime Played by the Basque Peasantry.

Popular among the Basque peasantry is an ancient game known as triquet. No one knows the origin of triquet; like all Basque customs, it can be traced back and back till its history is lost in a remote past. Nearly every court in the country bears the aspect of extreme age. The court at Bayonne is believed to be 400 years old, and the one at St. Jean de Luz looks older than the one at Bayonne. When Louis XIV., who was married in St. Jean de Luz church, went down to the little frontier town to meet his Spanish bride he found the Basques of St. Jean de Luz energetically playing their ancient game; and he took the idea back with him to Paris, and from it largely modified comes the game of tennis. Tennis and triquet are very similar, save that instead of racquets a leather arrangement, known as a glove, is used for propelling the ball.

OLDEST PERSON IN AFRICA

Census Enumerators Unearth Extraordinary Specimen of Longevity—Woman Is 112 Years Old.

During their investigations the census enumerators in the Krugersdorp district unearthed an extraordinary specimen of longevity in the person of a very old native woman, whose age is believed to exceed 112 years. She went to the Transvaal with the original band of the rebellious subjects of Chaka, the Zulu Napoleon. Her parchment face is wrinkled like a piece of corrugated iron or a walnut shell, and she is stone deaf, but is otherwise in possession of all her faculties. She is surrounded by a whole tribe of descendants, down to the fifth or sixth generation, and the superstitious natives invest her with all the mystic charms of immortality. She is believed to be one of King Edward's oldest subjects.

WAYSIDE INN FOR GESE.

Daniel Scott, Owner of "Scotland's" Plantation, Began the Custom of Feeding Wild Fowl.

Years before the war Daniel Scott, the owner of "Scotland's" plantation, in Albemarle county, Va., began the custom of feeding flocks of wild geese each spring and summer on their semi-annual migrations. The custom has continued to this day, being kept up by the descendants of Mr. Scott. He had a special garment which he donned when feeding the hungry birds, and in this they invariably recognized him. The children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren of the first geese have been well instructed in regard to this "wayside inn," for they always tarry there to get provisions. United States Senator Thomas S. Martin is the present owner of "Scotland's."

French Imports.

During the first four months of 1904 the imports of material into France necessary to industry were \$6,272,500 less than for the same period in 1903, while elementary products show an increase of \$579,060, and manufactured goods an increase of \$221,950, as compared with the same classes of imports during the first four months of 1903.
