ON ABSENCE OF THE NOSE

Without This Organ Life Would Not Be Worth Living—One Form of Punishment.

As the learned physician has observed, "the nose is a very becoming part of the face;" and its value in this respect is never fully appreciated until it is lost. Such deprivation, however it may have been brought about, entails the sufferer extreme misery. The absence of a nose is so utterly obvious that it must be seen by every one, and the effect on the patient may be much greater than might have been anticipated. The patient consequently shuns society and every appearance in public, and often is oppressed with a self-loathing and abasement almost amounting to the blackest

accident or through gangrene from cold, and Maisonveuve has described a case in which the organ was congenitally absent; but undoubtedly the absence of a nose in many cases to be attributed to a less reputable cause, and it is not improbable that this popular ascription of the origin of the condition is, in part at least, the explanation of the very great mental effect of the loss of a nose.

In some parts of the world, especially Italy and India, it has been customary to employ removal of the nose as a form of punishment, sometimes judicial, but usually as a mode of carrying out private revenge. Especially in some districts of India it is considered a suitable form of punishment for a husband to inflict on a wife whose conduct he does not approve. Among the Romans this penalty was not at all rarely inflicted, both by law and private animosity. Inasmuch as the evil was especially prevalent in certain countries, it would not be unreasonable to expect that methods of treatment should first arise there, and so it proved; for countries which were preeminent in possessing numbers of suitable subjects for operation were the first in which operations were devised and practiced for the relief of the deformity.

FIND CAUSE FOR DISEASE.

Sleeping Sickness, It is Said, Can Be Attributed to the "Trypanosomiasis."

An important and valuable discovery relative to the deadly sleeping sickness has been made by the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine, says the Scientific American. The cause of this disease, according to the results of elaborate diagnoses that have been made, is attributable to "trypanosomiasis," i. e., the presence in the blood, and in the fluids of the brain and spinal cord, of some form of the microscopic parasite known as "trypanosoma," which is propagated by the tsetse fly in South Africa. From the close observations that have been made upon the afflicted patients, the symptoms and the danger bear some relation to the greater or less abundance of the parasites, and develop seriously when they have entered the cerebro-spinal fluid. The parasite may be present in the blood of deeply-seated organs, when they are not to be found in that which is drawn from a skin puncture, and their frequent temporary disappearances from this surface blood renders it difficult sometimes to be certain of their presence in the system. The expedition organized by the school also discovered a blood-sucking larva, which thrives in many parts of the Congo. During the daytime this larva conceals itself in the cracks of the native floors, and only attacks its victims during the night. When dug up they are found to be full of bright red blood, thereby testifying to the severity of their attack during the previous night. It is the larva of the Glossina fly which is apparently harmless in the imago state. This discovery is of great value, and systematic measures to combat its injurious nature will at once be inaugurated.

LIONESS ATTACKS TRAINER

Subtlety of an Expert Trainer's Judgment of His Beasts Shown by Incident.

When the Tiger Princess was going to give up one of her old performers because he was getting sulky and peevish, Sterrett looked over the troupe and said:

"That one is all right, but the one over in the corner will bear watching."

"Why, the man acts like a fool," said the princess. "That's Zulka. She's the best actor I've got."

Sterrett laughed. "Train an understudy," he advised. "I'll give Zulka three weeks to retire from the stage. She's going bad."

Zulka was a beautiful young lioness; one of the best trick beasts I've ever known and one of the very few that seemed to have a genuine affection for the trainer, says McClure's Magazine. As a rule the felines don't exhibit the softer emotions. They feel for men either indifference or distaste. But this lioness used to show signs of pleasure when her mistress entered the cage, and I've seen her put her muzzle up against the bars to fawn on the queen. Two weeks after Sterrett's advice, to which we paid little heed (that was when I knew less about him than I subsequently learned), I saw the lioness caressing the woman at the close of the performance. As the Tiger Princess entered the cage the next day there was a snarl and a scream and she was down. Zulka had her. Fortunately some of us were near. We beat the animals off—of course, some of the other beasts had to pitch in, seeing their tyrant down—and got the woman out with no worse injury than a broken arm and a badly clawed back.

Queer Chatham Island.

One of the queerest corners of the earth is Chatham island, off the coast of Ecuador. This island lies 600 miles west of Guayaquil, and the equator runs directly through it. Capt. Reinman, who was sent to the Galapagos group of islands to inquire into the proper grounding of a deep-sea cable stopped at Chatham island, and says it abounds in cats, every one of which is black. These animals live in the crevices of the lava foundation near the coast, and subsist by catching fish and crabs instead of rats and mice. Other animals found on the island are horses, cattle, dogs, goats and chickens, all of which are perfectly wild.
