The only question is: Did a woman write the letter? Here it is: "I am an athletic girl; I hunt all the winter and golf all the summer. I am a 'jolly good sort,' and all that—we are in a way pals to every man, especially if he is very young and afraid of any more feminine women. But no one wants to marry us except some penniless subaltern or equally penniless curate.
"Last summer I was at a garden party with many 'sportswomen.' I heard a man—a real man—say: 'They all look as if they had their best clothes on!' I was staggered, but I looked—we did—and as if they were some one else's best clothes into the bargain. I looked at my image in the glass when I got home and wondered what man on earth would want to kiss my broad, hard hand, or whose heart could beat one stroke more at the sight of my clumsy figure.
"At this same party was a smooth, white, cool woman, whose voice was not a rusty hinge like ours, and whose movements were music, too—without rolling of hips and shoulders. Her clothes grew to her as naturally as her satin skin. "CRIBS" FOR EXAMINATIONS
Articles of Daily Use Often Used by School Pupils When Hard Tests Are at Hand.
