which has been appointed to investigate the feasibility of so employing the convicts. Since that time this office has been overwhelmed with letters and newspapers containing discussions of the question, and without exception, all favor the scheme. This is as we thought it would be, so far as the attitude of the people of the state is concerned, but we must confess we hardly expected the matter so very much alive as to bring such vigorous favorable action in so short a time. The Labor Press assures one and all that it deeply appreciates their interest in the matter and trusts that they will not let opportunity pass to keep the question before their readers.

While it is the duty of this commission to go into a careful study of the expense and manner of employing the Oregon convicts on the Oregon roads, thus to practically determine the feasibility of the project, the Labor Press has not the least doubt to begin with, but that it is just as feasible for Oregon as for other states, and that it is far more feasible to thus employ them in very necessary work for the state than to hire them to a private concern at 35c each per day. If a convict can be hired at 35c cash per day to a private concern it's a safe guess he is worth as much more to the state, and the writer is, and for a long time has been convinced that a popular demand that the state so use the convicts was the main thing needed in order to have it done. Past legislatures have shied at the proposition because the convicts have long been a heavy burden and the plan of hiring them to the stove-makers is about the first that has been made them self-sustaining. For this reason, and because of little popular demand, the legislators have declined to try the experiment of road-building.

With the tremendous growth in store for our state and the manifest value of everything that will tend to improve the public roads, there can be no question that such employment of the convicts will return far better than the present plan of hiring a portion of them to a private concern at 35c a day. The press of the state can make this an issue and urge that candidates for the legislative branches favor it. It is not a party issue, but a popular one. It is a good thing. Help it along.—Labor Press.

Friday, County Clerk Moses returned to Sheriff Burnett the delinquent tax roll for 1905. The clerk found the amount of the delinquency a few dollars in excess of the figures formerly given by the GAZETTE. At the time of returning the roll to the sheriff the clerk issued a warrant commanding the sheriff to make collection and if necessary to sell the property at public sale for the amount of taxes, penalties, interest and accruing costs against property assessed.

A few days ago Paul Truitt, who is quite a prominent farmer, living near Wren, wrote a friend of this city an account of a harrowing accident that recently befell his young son. It seems that the lad was harrowing on what is known as the V. born place and did not return home at the time he was expected. On this account Mr. Truitt and other sons went to look him up. They found the boy with his foot fast in the harrow and that implement on top of the plowing him down in such a way that it was impossible for him to get up or extricate himself. The boy has been under the harrow for three hours and during this time the team had stood quietly hitched to the harrow. The boy was not hurt and aside from being numbed was all right. It certainly was a narrow escape for Joe and the team is entitled to green pasture for the rest of their days.
