GIVES BENTON MENTION.

The food, water and climate conditions are such that they give milk exceptionally free from undesirable flavors and odors, a fact which gives the Willamette Valley dairyman a great advantage over his brother in the Eastern States.

Notwithstanding these favorable conditions, however, the supply of dairy products is no where near equal to the demand. Carloads of butter and tons of cheese are annually brought to Oregon markets from the dairy regions of the Mississippi Valley. Other carloads of dairy products are shipped through the state for the Alaskan and Oriental markets, which could be manufactured cheaper here than in Iowa and Illinois. Large quantities of condensed milk are used by our people and by ships which purchase their supplies in our markets, yet there is not a milk condensing plant in our state. Last year first class creamery butter ranged from 17 to 30 cents per pound, the extreme prices prevailing for about the same length of time. Cheese prices ranged from 10 to 14 cents per pound.

From the foregoing facts some idea of the county's inducements to the energetic, up-to-date dairyman may be gained. No industry offers more flattering returns.

Washington Forests.

The Forest Service is now studying 1,367,000 acres of forest land in Washington. In the western part of the state the work covers 1,300,000 acres. The results of this work, which will be continued during the coming year, will be of great value in throwing light on the problems of protecting these coast forests from fire and preventing the present excessive waste in logging, as well as in developing a plan for future timber production.

The large number of growth and volume measurements obtained by the Service during the past few years in this region provides a basis for estimates of present stand and future yield of the more important timber trees. From these measurements it appears the red fir in the region of Puget Sound is one of the fastest-growing trees in the United States, surpassing even the loblolly pine of the South in height and volume growth. The yield table shows that larger crops of timber may be expected from second-growth forests of fir and hemlock than from any other kind of tree yet studied by the Service.

A detailed study of waste in logging was part of the work called for. Stumps are now cut on an average about 6 feet high, and in large timber this means the loss of a great number of board feet of clear lumber per acre. Waste also occurs in the use of fir logs for skids and bridges and in leaving merchantable logs in the tops. An estimate of this waste will be made by actual measurement.

In eastern Washington a tract of 67,000 acres has been examined. The forest is typical of a large region. It consists of western yellow pine, fir and lodgepole pine. The object of the owners was to determine the practicability of obtaining a second cut of timber from the cut-over lands. The field work occupied a party of three men for one month. To secure a basis for an estimate of future stand, studies were made of the volume and rate of growth of the important species, the proportion of small trees left, the culled forest, and the reproduction after logging. The growth of timber here, though much slower than in western Washington, promises well for the future, and the rapid increase in lumber and stumpage values is a strong inducement to conservative lumbering. By setting a high diameter limit of cutting and by preventing fire, a fair second cut can be obtained within a reasonable period, and excellent reproduction for later crops will be secured.
